WASHINGTON, April 23.—(AP)—The Big Three foreign ministers dropped the tangled Polish issue today and broadened the scope of their talks by calling in Chinese Foreign Minister T. T. Soong tonight. The Polish question was seemingly dropped for the time being to await Moscow's reaction on the discussions that had just before 11:30 p.m. Soong came up tonight in the office of Secretary of State Stettinius, and after a conference with the usual Allied nations conference were discussed.
