LEGISLATURE TO CONTINUE UNTIL TODAY

Since the Adjournment is Expected After This Morning

CLOCKS STOPPED

End of Session Due On Thursday Is Held Over Three Days

PHOENIX, March 12.—(AP)—Worn by long hours of almost continuous work, the Arizona legislature recessed at 4:15 o'clock this morning until 10 a. m. Monday.

Important measures which still remain to be acted upon before the adjournment is the general appropriation bill, as it is expected that the senate after that bill is passed, will recommend a total vote of \$14,000,000.

House and senate already have passed at 11:30 p. m. Saturday and the legislature had hoped to complete its session today. But it was not to be.

The senate today has passed the bill to amend the constitution to provide for a general election in 1936, and the legislature will adjourn today.
