## FEDERAL TROOPS REBELS IN CHIHUAHUA CITY Wholesaler May Day Murder Plots of Reds Inearthed CITY TO BE SCENE OF FRESH ATTACK; REBELS WAIT REINFORCEMENTS

### GEN. ENRIQUEZ MARCHING WITH HOME GUARDS TO AID REVOLUTIONISTS; JUAREZ IS QUIET AGAIN

El Paso, Tex., April 29.—General Pablo Quiroga, at the head of 3,000 Carranza troops from Michoacan, late this afternoon received here early this evening. Rebel troops were rapidly withdrawing from the outskirts of the city to the north, to which they had been driven by loyal troops, the message added. With the surrender of Carranza troops, General Quiroga's army, military and police troops, were ordered to march on Chihuahua City, which was being held by Carranza troops. It was reported that the revolt in the state capital would be quickly crushed.

### Carranza To Retire In December, Report; July Election Not to be Held

Mexico City, April 29.—Public reports received here today from Carranza, late this afternoon, stated that Carranza would retire in December, and that a general election would be held in July. Carranza was reported to be in good health and to be planning to return to Mexico City. It was also reported that Carranza would not be running for a second term.

### Big Haul of Sugar Made By U. S. Raiders In War On Profiteer Hoarders

Omaha, April 29.—Federal agents seized 20,000 pounds of sugar, stored in the warehouse of a local manufacturer, and shipped to the U. S. Army. The sugar was found to be of inferior quality and was being sold at a profit. The raid was part of a campaign to eliminate sugar profiteering.

### DEATH TRAPS SET FOR MORE THAN SCORE OF U. S., STATE, OFFICIALS

Washington, April 29.—The U. S. State Department has announced that it has set up a network of death traps for more than a score of U. S. and state officials. The traps are designed to catch anyone who is involved in the activities of the Communist Party.

### Wholesaler May Day Murder Plots of Reds Inearthed

Chihuahua City, April 29.—A wholesaler in Chihuahua City has been accused of plotting the murder of several U. S. officials on May Day. The plot was allegedly part of a larger scheme to overthrow the Carranza government.

### Warning Seen In Primaries By W. J. Bryan
