LIZZIE BORDEN FOUND NOT GUILTY.

NEW BEDFORD, June 20.—The jury has acquitted Lizzie Borden of murder.

At the conclusion of the charge the attorneys consulted for a few moments and the jury was allowed to retire.

It was 4:30 o'clock when the spectators who had kept their seats patiently during the retirement of the jury noticed a movement indicating their return. In a moment the twelve men filed into their seats and were polled.

Miss Borden was asked to stand up and the foreman was asked to return the verdict, which he announced

"NOT GUILTY."

Then all the dignity and decorum of the court room vanished.

A cheer went up which might have been heard for half a mile away and there was no attempt to check it.

THE PAT MAN HAD PLUCK.

He Tackled the Stage Robber, but Got Cut.

In 1881 Mike Hoadley was a passenger on the Milton stage when it was held up by a lone Italian highwayman. There were four or five passengers. Mr. Hoadley, all young, strong men, who could not fail to see their names in print in connection with this incident.

The Italian, a tall, athletic fellow, stepped out and held a rock at the foot of a steep hill, and laid a shotgun at the driver ordered him to stop and throw out the box. The driver did so and handed the box, which contained several hundred dollars, to the robber, who took it in his left hand and remarked that that was all he wanted.

Hoadley looked at the robber and said:

"Don't you think you've got a lot of cheek to hold up a stage with five men in it?"

"It doesn't bother me," replied the robber.

"Well, you've got more cheek to make any impromptu remarks on the subject when nobody has bothered you. Have you got any money about you?"

"Yes, I have," said Hoadley. "Two got a hundred dollars, but what of it?"

"Nothing but a hundred dollars I want and will allow you to keep it if you don't hand it out lively."

He then said: "I am not saying the robber sighted along his gun barrel to Mr. Hoadley's head. He looked as if he meant business, and when Hoadley saw the gun he sprang and held it out to the robber.

Hoadley sat on the front seat between the driver and another man, and in handing the purse to the robber he had to lean forward and across the other passenger, who stirred hand in foot to help the old gentleman. Hoadley had to lower his gun, step close to the stage and reach up for the purse.

Just as the robber grabbed the purse Hoadley pitched forward and buried himself upon the floor, landing astride of him and bearing him to the ground. The Italian, Hoadley, weighed over 200 pounds and had a hard job to shake him off, but Hoadley was much the older man and his wind did not last long. The struggle on the ground lasted a minute or more, and when the passengers gone to Hoadley's assistance they could have overpower and bound the robber with any of them stirred hand in foot to help the old gentleman. Hoadley got out from under him and took possession of his gun, which he had dropped when he fell upon him.

"You are the cheekiest old man I ever saw," said the Italian, as Hoadley, almost breathless and wholly exhausted, scrambled to his feet and began breaking the dust from his clothes.

"That's all right," panted the old gentleman, "but if those cowards on the stage had seen us, we'd have had you tied up and the joke would have been on you."

Now Hoadley could be a finding end of the incident to the relief of all agents, admiring the spirit and courage of the old gentleman, returned to him his purse and punished the cowards of the other passengers by giving them a good drubbing.

The old man had to give all his money and what he had left in his pocket of that type went out of fashion long ago, and the cold, unromantic truth of the matter is that the Italian, Mike Hoadley's \$100, didn't rob the others and went away with the brush with his gun and the express box.

The sheriff took his trail that same day and followed him to a wayside saloon, but forgot to search him and when the robber was taken to jail he paid Hoadley's \$100 to a lawyer to defend him. The trial was protracted, convicted and sent to prison. John Doe, and he never was identified otherwise, and the express box that he stole was never found.—San Francisco Examiner.

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while Mr. Adams seemed incapable of speech.

As soon as possible the room was cleared, and when the spectators were finally gone Miss Borden was taken to the room of the justices and allowed to recover her composure, with only the eyes of friends upon her and the carresses of devoted admirers. At the expiration of an hour she was placed in a carriage and driven to the station where she took a train for Fall River, which is probably no longer her home, but still was the only objective point for the immediate present.

At the opening of the trial this morning District Attorney Knowlton resumed argument in behalf of the commonwealth.

He addressed himself to the motive of murder. He pointed out the enmity of Lizzie toward her step-mother as sufficient motive for her murder and said her killing necessitated the killing of her father, a stern man who knew of the enmity and loved his dead wife. The only way for Lizzie to possibly escape punishment lay in killing her father.

Andrew Borden and his second wife were found murdered in their home in Fall River, Mass. It may have been the brutality of the murders that landed the small notice on the front page of the Arizona Daily Star, more than 2,500 miles away.

Borden's daughter Lizzie was charged with the murders and went on trial. The evidence was circumstantial and the jury acquitted her after a short deliberation.
