## WORKERS' STRIKE

### FOUR CHILDREN KILLED AS BUS AND TRAIN HIT

Four Other Persons Hurt As Katy Crossing Crash Occurs  
DRIVER IS INJURED  
No Watchman to Guard Thoroughfare, Witnesses Reveal

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., April 22.—Four children were killed here today and four other persons were injured when a truck in which they were riding was demolished at a grade crossing by a Missouri-Kansas-Texas passenger train.

The dead: Wentzel Brock, 12, his sister, Sylvia, 11, and Mary Lou, 8, and Sue Clark, 12.

Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Brock are the parents of the Brock children. Brock had been employed by the M. K. & T. Thompson, driver of the truck, was injured slightly; Ruth Clark, daughter of Brock, was hurt seriously, and Audrey and Thomas Thompson, 18 and 8, respectively, were injured slightly.

The crash was at the intersection of Tenth street and the railroad tracks. The crossing is not guarded and no watchman is stationed there. There is no signal.

An eye witness said: "My son and I were out in the road picking grapes. We saw the truck drive up the crossing and there was a crash, a cloud of dust and we went running and picked up the wreckage lying in the air. We ran out to the accident and saw several people lying along the side of the track and we were all very shocked."

The recovered bodies were charred and mutilated, indicating a very quick with the earthquake explosion which shook the countryside yesterday.

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### BITTER FIGHTS IN MADRID ARE POLITICAL WAR

Two Dead, Eleven Hurt As Business Halls Workers Quit

MADRID, April 22.—(AP)—Anti-Fascists and extremists laid siege today to Madrid and surrounding towns, leaving two dead and 11 wounded in a series of bitter clashes with their opponents and with the authorities.

The disorders, flaring despite heavy government repression, were simultaneous with a strike in the coal fields, and transportation services and public utilities, threatening to become general.

Among those invited to give their views on the current situation were the two main political parties, the Socialists (P. S.) and the Falangists (F. I.).

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### SILVER BLOC TO MEET TODAY TO TALK OF METAL

Remonetization Is Not All Of Hope, Senator Thomas Says  
ROOSEVELT AGAINST SEES AMENDMENT TO FARM ACT SUFFICIENT FOR ALL PURPOSES

WASHINGTON, April 22.—(AP)—Members of the congressional silver bloc will meet tomorrow to find what can be done about President Roosevelt's definite opposition to any mandatory legislation for remonetization of the metal.

The conference was called by one of the leaders for its purpose, Senator Thomas (D-Calif.), who said that he had a strong sentiment developing for a bill to remonetize the metal.

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### Death Takes J. Knox Corbett Resident of City Since 1880

Pioneer Was Born in Sumter, South Carolina, in 1861; Served as Postmaster Under Harrison, McKinley, Roosevelt, Taft

J. Knox Corbett, 72, died yesterday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. Last night Tucson paid its respects to one of its pioneers, looking back over a long career which included activity as surveyor, stage driver, postmaster, railway lumber dealer, mayor, political leader, hardware merchant and good citizen.

Mr. Corbett was born June 20, 1861, in Sumter, South Carolina, son of an old Southern family which has a large plantation during the Civil war.

### RECOGNITION OF UNION IS POINT BEING DISPUTED

Meanwhile 50,000 Workers In Coal Fields Are Asked to Return  
SCALE IS CHANGED  
Roosevelt Requests Them To Go Back to Jobs In Field

A new wage structure for the soft coal industry, partially restoring differentials in miners' pay in some regions, was announced Sunday night as President Roosevelt asked nearly 50,000 striking miners to return to work.

Hugh S. Johnson, NRA administrator, proclaimed the new order, a change from the NRA mandate of March 3.

Meanwhile a strike of a "national" of 7,000 workers in the Fisher body plant in Cleveland was called off Tuesday by the NRA.

The points at issue in the Cleveland strike were wage agreements and union recognition. Union leaders at St. Louis said the strike call was a result of the refusal of the Chevrolet and Fisher companies to recognize 13,000 men, most of whom had been active in union affairs.

The labor board at Detroit planned a new attack on the hard and the workers strike, but the party works strike Monday. Whether the new strike would be successful, it was not known.

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
