## Haugh Bill Would Cut Home Tax

**Measure Is Aimed At Personal Goods**

PHOENIX — A bill which would give homeowners a reduction in tax, by eliminating the personal property levy on household goods and furniture was introduced in the House Wednesday.

It is expected to depend on whether the Arizona Legislature tackles the problem of setting state wide assessment percentages this year.

Rep. John Haugh, R-Pima, House majority leader and one of the sponsors of the bill, said the net effect of the measure would be to reduce assessments on the average homeowner by about 10 percent.

It is basically the same bill Haugh introduced last year and which got introduced in amendments and bogged down in various committees.

The Pima legislator said Wednesday he believes the success of the bill depends in large measure on what the legislature does about setting assessment percentages this year.

"If the legislature does not do anything with percentages this year then there is a fair chance that this could be on the ballot in the fall," he said.

## B52 May Have Lost N-Bomb

**AF Searchers Roam Spanish Countryside**  
MADRID, Spain (AP) — U.S. Air Force searchers are collecting every scrap of wreckage to be found from the B52 bomber and KC135 tanker that collided and crashed Monday. Their activities included reports that the bomber had carried nuclear devices and they have been lost.

Air Force officials declined to confirm reports that the wreckage of the B52 bomber and KC135 tanker that collided and crashed Monday.

The probe found on the scene, near Almeria, 200 miles southeast of Madrid in the Mediterranean coast, were being flown by the B52 bomber and KC135 tanker.
