AMERICA WATCHES
Fears No Immediate Bad

BRUSSELS, March 28.—(AP)—Abandonment of the gold standard, a 27 per cent devaluation of the currency and the tying up of Belgium's franc with the British pound were understood tonight from reliable quarters to be provided in a declaration the new cabinet will make to parliament.

These Opposite
Van Zeeland's coalition cabinet which this week resigned, headed by Georges Theunis, has left opposition to parliament which it declares to be inevitable.

A considerable bloc of legislators favors retaining the franc, while the bulk of the cabinet, headed by Van Zeeland, favors the devaluation.

Meanwhile, treasury officials adopted for the time being a new method of short-term financing. Instead of borrowing \$100,000,000 as has been the case, the amount will be restricted to \$50,000,000.

Weekly maturities total \$75,000,000 of this amount, \$25,000,000 will be redeemed for the present to cash from the treasury's \$2,287,000,000 general fund. To this amount, a certain extent the plan is inflexible.

Revaluation of the gold bloc currencies has been regarded for months as inevitable. However the nations principally involved—France, Belgium, Italy, and Switzerland—have been engaged in an effort to postpone such action until after the stabilization of the dollar and the pound.
