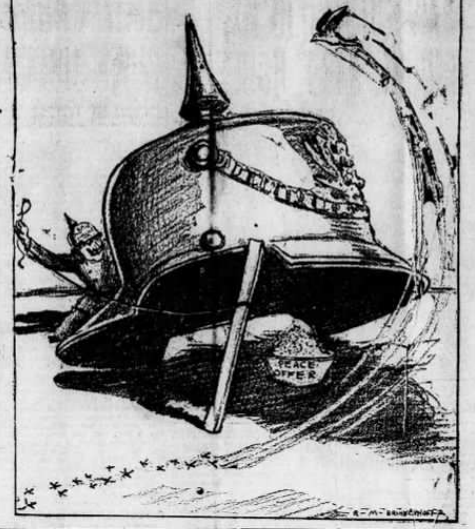
Power of Government Over Liquor Is Settled, Says Opinion on Webb-Kenyon Measure; Ban on "Personal Use" Approved.
