Police Probing Tucson Labor Leader's Death

Howard D. Grant, 52, long-time Tucson labor leader, died yesterday morning following a drinking bout that left him in slumbers in his office in the Labor Temple at 267 S. Stone Ave.

Police are investigating unexplained circumstances surrounding the death which Dr. Louis F. Hirsch, county medical examiner, said was due to brain contusions caused by a fractured skull.

Hirsch said following an autopsy: "It would be highly unusual if injuries this severe were caused by a fall or fall on an intoxicated man as described by police."
