

TRADITION WILL HAVE TO YIELD, CHIEF BELIEVES

Threat of Balanced Army, Navy, Air Force Forces Upheld in Future

CHICAGO, April 14.—(AP)—Gen. Omar Bradley said today the United States may have to sacrifice to the joint sovereignty and furnish North Atlantic area defense a navy or air force greater than "we would normally be willing to provide."

Thus, he said, it may become necessary in future years to raise the size of each unit to the joint defense plans of North Atlantic

The possibility arises from a suggestion that the United States should have a central body within the Atlantic treaty framework should decide that low and high seas and air forces must be extended, said
