FULL POWER TO USE FORCE OF U. S. TO BE GIVEN WILSON

Not for Years Did Germany Awake to Need to Win Over Neutral Opinion

SECRET SERVICE NIPS PLOT IN AMERICA TO AID GERMANY; 'MOVIE' MEN ARE ARRESTED

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—Agents of the department of justice arrested here tonight two men charged with violating the federal law against carrying on a "military espionage" against a foreign country. They are accused of plotting to furnish military information in England to be sent to the country and then forwarded to Germany.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—There were strong indications tonight that some new administrative development preliminary to the president's next step in the crisis with Germany will be announced within a few days before congress adjourns for the session, a week from this Sunday.

(By Associated Press) PHOENIX, Feb. 19.—(From a Staff Correspondent of the Associated Press.)—According to statements made to the correspondent before his departure from Berlin, with former Ambassador Gerard, by public men in Germany, the German government did not want well known after the beginning of the war to the detriment of the state's credit in neutral countries or, at least, of laying its side of the case before the world in the neutral zone. An outpouring of one hundred thousands of marks has since been made with the employment of considerable numbers of officers and men and with constantly changing systems in the effort to achieve censorship.
