SLAVS APPROVE TITO'S RULE IN NATIONAL VOTE

Early Returns Indicating Marshall's Party Gets 85% of Ballots

By ALEX SINGLETON BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Monday, March 27.—(AP)—Early election returns today showed Premier Marshal Tito and his unopposed candidate for parliament were receiving more than 80 per cent of the votes cast.

There was no opposition Tito, Yugoslav voters had the choice yesterday of either voting for Tito and his partners of the people's front candidates or casting a negative ballot. Voting was extremely heavy.

The tally asked for a large vote by his party to show that the election is behind him in his fight with the unopposed Communist and Tito's Communists and the Communists who give allegiance to Moscow have been leading for more than two years. Russia and its satellites have imposed an economic boycott on Yugoslavia.

Officials said nearly 100 per cent of the electorate in Yugoslavia were turned out. Starting at dawn and continuing until 10 p.m., voters streamed to the polling places and cast their ballots.

Little Boy Snatched By Elephant, Killed While Parents Watch

SARASOTA, Fla., March 26.—(AP)—A little boy was snatched from the side of his horrified parents and killed by an elephant today by a circus elephant.

The boy's body was crushed under the elephant's trunk. The parents were so shocked that they did not even try to get their child's body.

The boy was taken to a doctors' hospital, where he was pronounced dead.
