WASHINGTON (AP) — Trucking strikes apread to 37 cities Wednesday night during national wage talks for 455,000 learnsters. The industry claimed incidents of violence but pledged out to retaliate with a nationwide lock-

In the air traffic dispute, controllers recounted off the job in large numbers and declared they would not return until negotiations are opened with an outside third party. The government said it would not negotiate until the men to hock.

The stalemate blocked hopes for a quick end to the dispute that has restricted air traffic across the country for more than a week.

France Proposes New Meeting On Asian Strife

PARIS (AP) — France proposed Wednesday an international conference to bring peace to Cambodia, Laos and Victnam, formerly French Indochina, Paris is ready to "offer its active contribution to this enterprise," the government said:

"Recent events in Laos and Cambodia have considerably aggravated the situation in Indochina" and "contributed to the extension of the Vietnamese conflict to the entirety of the peninsula," said a communique.

"The same hope subsists that the Vietnamese conflict can be ended by a negotiated set terment which guarantees the existence of a South Vietnam really neutral and independent."The success of this policy implies the con-

The U.S. Veterans' Administration, however, recently found the "sharing agreement" illegal, on the grounds that the still-under-construction medical school hospital did not have beds to share with the veterans' hospital.

With the sharing agreement declared void the veterans' hospital can no longer permit the medical school to treat any but Veterans' Administration-eligible patients in the veterans

3 Grape Growers Settle With Union

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Contract agreement between the AFL-CIO farm workers union and three growers representing about one-seventh of the table grape production in the Coachella Valley was announced Wednesday at the headquarters of the Los Angeleloman Catholic diocese, which had sponsored

The three growers are the David Freedma Co, of Thermal-Indio, Calif.; Wonder Palm Ranch of Indio, Calif., partially owned is Freedman, and Travertine Ranch, of Ossi Calif., owned by Charies Freedman. The three cultivate 7.80 octrus of table grapes.

The contract cashs for \$1.75 an hour, plus \$5-cent homes for each how picked.
