MEXICO CITY — Oil refinery workers nationwide began returning to work yesterday, ending a series of strikes and rallies to protest the bloody arrest of their union boss...

PHOENIX — The state Department of Health Services took emergency action yesterday to guarantee anonymity to Arizonans who test positive for the AIDS virus. The 4-1 vote of the department's Communicable Diseases Advisory Council was met with applause from about 50 AIDS experts from around the state...

Among those wanting the new rule is a 12-year-old Tucson boy with hemophilia who thinks he may have been transfused with AIDS-infected blood. Twenty-five doctors, lawyers and other experts last September signed a petition filed by Southern Arizona Legal Aid Inc. on the boy's behalf...

SIERRA VISTA — Rep. Jim Kolbe walked into a daylong dose of Sierra Vista's fear and anger yesterday. The fear stems from the impending loss of nearly 2,600 mostly high-paying civilian and military jobs in Fort Huachuca's Information Systems Command.

Kolbe, a Tucson Republican, took the hot seat at meetings yesterday with the Sierra Vista Chamber of Commerce and its Economic Development Foundation, with civil service employees at City Hall, with city and Cochise County officials and with business and community leaders.

140 nations condemn use of chemical weapons

PARIS — Diplomats from more than 140 nations yesterday condemned the use of chemical weapons and called for a stepped-up effort to complete a treaty banning the development, production and possession of such weapons.

The conference was called at the initiative of the United States because of concerns raised over the use of poison gas by Iraq — and to a lesser extent, Iran — in their eight-year war, in which a cease-fire was declared last year.
