Forty-Six I.W.W. Leaders In California Are Found Guilty of Anti-War Plots

San Francisco, Jan. 16.—The 46 defendants in the I. W. W. conspiracy case were found guilty by a jury in the United States district court here today. The verdict, "guilty as charged," was returned at 11 o'clock after the jury had been out since 9:30 a. m. Sentence on the case, which was held in the United States district court here today, was 10 years in prison for each defendant.

MINIMUM WAGE BILL TO BE INTRODUCED IN SENATE

Washington, Jan. 16.—With the introduction of an amendment to the minimum wage law for women, the first of the controversial labor legislation of the present session of the legislature is to be introduced in the Senate today. The bill, which is a modification of the present law, would raise the minimum wage from \$12 to \$20 per week. The bill carries a penalty clause providing that if the minimum wage is not paid for more than 30 days, the employer shall be liable for the amount of the minimum wage for each day.
