LAREDO, Tex., March 25.—Army officials in Nuevo Laredo are without information concerning the reports sent out from here that General Luque had been murdered.

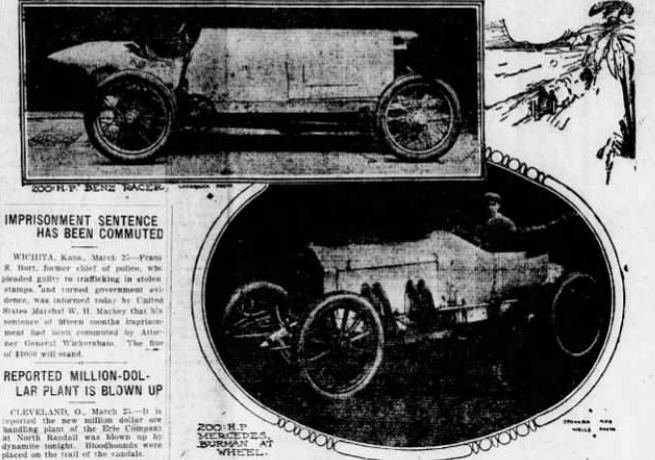
FILLING MONTEREY JAIL WITH RY. PASSENGERS

TERRIBLE LOSS OF LIFE A NEW YORK FIRE

Girl Employes of Shirtwaist Factory Egotically Leap from Eighth, Ninth and Tenth Stories to Death.

HUNDRED AND FORTY-EIGHT ARE KNOWN DEAD

Heartrending Scenes Enacted by the Score—Owners of Establishment Escapes Over Roofs—University Students Save 40 Girls.

NEW YORK, March 25.—One hundred and forty-eight persons, including 100 girls of the Knickerbocker Hotel, were crushed to death on pavement, smothered or burned to a crisp this afternoon in the great fire which broke out in the Triangle Shirtwaist Company on the eighth, ninth and tenth floors of No. 23 Washington place.

At ten minutes before five o'clock the eighth floor was the point of origin of the fire, the cause being unknown. The large upper floors were the only ones saved. There was not an outside fire escape on the building. The girls were in the room when the fire broke out.

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Although the building stands on a corner lot only two or three narrow streets were left. A few passenger elevators, but no stairways, remained standing and a light shaft. All were crushed under the weight of the falling mass of masonry.

Seven hundred hands, 500 of them women, were employed in the Triangle Shirtwaist Company, said in its report of a building which had been built in 1902.

One young girl hung for three minutes by her finger tips when a tongue of flame licked them. She dropped into the fire net. The women fell at the same moment, the strand parted and three more were hurled to the death. Six girls crawled to a window, one woman was thrown and saved, but she was crushed to death.

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
