Labor, Improvements Items To Be Debated

INSKEEP Phoenix Staff Correspondent PHOENIX, Feb. 23.—Both the senate and house of the Arizona Legislature cleared their decks today for at least two days of debate on pending bills and resolutions, including the state department of labor bill in the house and a \$3,577,446 capital improvement program for the University of Arizona in the senate.

Faure Seated As French Premier

PARIS, Feb. 23.—The French national assembly tonight accepted Faure, a 46-year-old financial expert and attorney, as the nation's new premier. By a vote of 369-210, the deputies accepted Faure as the successor to Pierre Mendes-France, who was turned out of office Feb. 3. Faure, who held the job in 1952 for six weeks, will head the 21st government in France's post-liberation history.

Dulles Cites U.S. Power In Pacific

Forces In Far East Greater Than In War

BANGKOK, Thursday, Feb. 23.—U. S. Secretary of State Dulles told the southern Pacific defense conference yesterday that the power of U. S. forces in the eastern Pacific is greater than at the height of the war with Japan. In a sweeping review of the Far East situation, the secretary also made these points: "The United States has a military force in the Far East which is greater than at any time in our history. Executive Angered By Action

Slash's Supporters Called Irresponsible

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—President Eisenhower blasted the Democratic 830-000 person tax cut plan today. He called it the height of "fiscal irresponsibility."

He also accused the plan's backers of lacking the courage to submit a signed tax-cutting bill. This he charged them to abandon their present tactic of putting it forward as an amendment to another bill.

In a series of vigorous and sometimes heated statements at a news conference, the President declared a further tax cut at this time while the government is spending more than it receives would cut the value of the dollar and hurt the nation's economy.

"We simply cannot have this kind of thing in responsible government," he said. "It is not possible next year if the budget deficit is reduced."

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
