Legislature Faces Full Calendars

Labor, Improvements Items To Be Debated

PHOENIX, Feb. 23.—Both the senate and house of the Arizona Legislature cleared their decks today for at least two days of debate on pending bills and resolutions, including the state department of labor bill in the house and a \$3,074,446 capital improvement program for the University of Arizona in the senate.

The house will continue its committee hearings on the controversial bill establishing a department of labor, it was completely revised over the week end but still faces a stiff fight.

Anticipating completion of the bill on this measure in one day, the house majority caucused again tonight and agreed on a legislative calendar for Friday, included are:

Eighteen relatively unimportant bills which the lower house is expected to pass in a matter of days before taking up a quantity of legislation expected shortly from the upper house.

Some controversy is expected on bills permitting liquor during municipal and school elections, and one which deals with damage claims which survive the death of both parties to a damage and other bills for the estate of a person dying in an accident for which he is responsible.

Most important bill passed today in other house was a measure permitting cities and counties to increase their public works revenue fund levies from 2 cents to 50 cents on each \$100 of assessed valuation.

This is one of three proposals submitted to the senate by the legislature on the session by the effort to increase revenues with which the legislature is rapidly growing population.

Having originated in the senate, the bill is expected to pass by the house. That body, incidentally, still is holding a hearing on the so-called Tucson swimming pool bill.

The senate rules committee has scheduled consideration of the bills and resolutions each for tomorrow and Friday.

Only bill known to be controversial is the controversial calendar for the legislature in one establishing the position of director of the state highway department.

Heading the calendar, it calls for appointment by the governor of an official to direct all operations of the highway department, including the office of state engineer and executive secretary of the highway commission.

Responsible for the legislation is the statewide highway advisory committee which was created by the 21st legislative year.

Some objections are expressed from those who believe a director of such a high office would have too much authority.

Five of several capital improvement bills have been placed on tomorrow's tentative senate calendar. The first, appropriating \$2,200,750 to the University of Arizona for several projects, including additional classrooms and agricultural experimental programs, has been split by the rules committee into two almost equal parts, with part of the money becoming available in the fiscal year starting next July 1 and the remainder in the following fiscal year.

It is accompanied by two other measures, one appropriating \$487,000 for the purchase of land and construction of buildings, and the other permitting the issuance of \$2,000,000 in revenue bonds for construction of dormitory facilities.

Proposed for expenditure the first year under the appropriation bill, is \$2,000,000 for construction of a biological science building, \$100,000 for buildings and improvements at the Yuma valley experimental farm, and \$100,000 for the desert research station in Maricopa county. The remainder of the money is to be available in the following fiscal year.

Faure Seated As French Premier

PARIS, Feb. 23.—The French national assembly tonight accepted Faure as the successor to Pierre Mendes-France, who was turned out of office Feb. 3. Faure, who held the job in 1952 for six weeks, will head the 21st government in France's post-liberation history.

The vote ended a 19-day cabinet crisis.

The majority which the assembly gave Faure was much greater than he had expected. The only bloc opposition came from Communists and Socialists.

Mendes-France and a few of his die-hard supporters abstained on the vote.

Dulles Cites U.S. Power In Pacific

Forces In Far East Greater Than In War

BANGKOK, Thursday, Feb. 23.—U. S. Secretary of State Dulles told the southern states defense conference yesterday that the power of U. S. forces in the eastern Pacific is greater than at the height of the war with Japan.

In a sweeping review of the Far East situation, the secretary also made these points:

1. Potentially greater danger exists in the Far East today than at any time in the history of the world.

2. The United States has the largest and most powerful military forces in the world.

3. The United States has the largest and most powerful air force in the world.

4. The United States has the largest and most powerful navy in the world.

5. The United States has the largest and most powerful reserve force in the world.

6. The United States has the largest and most powerful industrial base in the world.

7. The United States has the largest and most powerful scientific and technological resources in the world.

8. The United States has the largest and most powerful economic resources in the world.

9. The United States has the largest and most powerful cultural resources in the world.

10. The United States has the largest and most powerful moral resources in the world.

11. The United States has the largest and most powerful spiritual resources in the world.

President Defied By Speaker

Universal \$20-A-Year Reduction Is Goal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—House Democrats led by Speaker Sam Rayburn ploughed ahead today with their drive to cut income taxes \$20 a year for everybody.

That was their defiant rejection to President Eisenhower's accusations of irresponsibility. The President told a news conference last night:

"When we talk about decreasing taxes at a time when the government, in spite of every effort, has been able to avoid a deficit almost twice as large as last year's, we are reaching some kind of height in fiscal irresponsibility."

Rayburn, in reply, said the Republicans engineered a tax cut last year in the face of an annual deficit almost twice as large as last year's, and he pointed sarcastically:

"When they didn't give the tax cut last year, they gave the deficit almost twice as large as last year's."

The conflict was the warmest yet between the two major parties in the 84th Congress.

The house vote and passage of the bill would mean a \$20-a-year reduction in income taxes for all taxpayers, including those on a fixed income.
