## DRIVE FOR LAW TO AID FARMER WELL STARTED

Temporary Legislation Must Go Through, Leaders Say  
PLAN IS OUTLINED  
Permanent Program May Be Delayed Until Next Year

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—A definite decision to get immediate "temporary" farm legislation continuing federal payments to farmers was reached today at a White House conference.

Administration leaders who talked over the problem with President Roosevelt said that while details remain to be worked out, the general plan would be to continue the present program of farm relief through the end of the year.

2. Farmers would be reimbursed for land that retired through federal "rent" payments.

3. Such authorization is necessary to be sought through amendments to existing laws rather than new ones.

4. An appropriation of \$100,000,000 to \$200,000,000 would be asked to finance the program's estimated cost in 1936.

5. An additional appropriation of about \$200,000,000 would be requested to reimburse farmers under the troubled 1935 adjustment contracts.

6. A permanent program might be sought later this session or deferred until next year.

7. Provisions of the AAA introduced by the supreme court decision would be strengthened and more fully utilized.

## Crowd Cheers Hoover While He Attacks Farm Program of New Deal and Gives Plan of Own

Former President Suggests Subsidy as Temporary Help  
New Road Must Be Built Back to Solid Ground, He Says, in Charging System of Scarcity Takes Away Much Without Giving Adequate Return

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Hoover Hoover tonight gave the most candid view of the future of agriculture in the University of Nevada's auditorium for the fourth of his series of attacks on New Deal policy.

"The crowd interrupted the speech at several points to applaud his attack on the New Deal and responded with laughter to many of his points," Hoover said.

"I believe it is the duty of the government to provide a subsidy to the farmer," Hoover said.

"The government should not be in the business of taking away the farmer's property without giving him adequate compensation," Hoover said.

"It was only 29 hours before the hour of execution," Hoffman said.
