Ooohh that smell! Vassar folks worry

VASSAR — This past summer – after Vassar's Canapa Valley Farms complex began growing marijuana indoors -Carson Atkins and Terry Mocny noticed an odor.

"It smelled like a skunk, at first," said Mocny, who lives along Norman Street on the east side of Vassar, population 2,727.

"It was kind of a mild smell, like somebody hit a skunk on the road from about half a block away."

The smell, they reckon, was coming from the new Canapa Valley Farms cannabis-growing complex, which had started growing marijuana indoors at

Trial date set for Frankenmuth man

SAGINAW

Frankenmuth man accused of defrauding federal government obtain money the wake of COVID-19 pandemic awaits a March 19 trial.

Saginaw County Circuit Court officials said they've set the trial date for Anthony Golden, 67, Frankenmuth,

state Attorney General Dana Nessel.

Nessel alleges Golden received two Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans totaling nearly \$41,000 by falsely claiming his income was impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The state alleges Golden sought and received forgiveness for those loans by representing that the funds were used

in compliance with PPP rules. Nessel's claims office Golden failed to report those loans as income on his tax returns.

The PPP was a federal business program established in 2020 to help certain businesses, selfemployed workers, sole proprietors and certain nonprofit organizations paying continue their workers.

But a 2022 study economist

charged with five crimes by the office of David Autor and others concluded that most of the program's benefits flowed to small-business owners and their creditors and suppliers, rather than to workers.

Golden is charged with two counts of obtaining more than \$20,000 by false pretenses. He also faces two counts of filing false tax returns, and is charged with using a computer to commit a crime.

The Advertiser couldn't reach Golden's

primarily for payroll attorney, Bloomfield Hills lawyer Paul their hard-earned money in a difficult time, Stablein, for comment.

If convicted of either count of obtaining more than \$20,000 by false pretenses, Golden would face a maximum sentence of 15 years in prison.

PPP loans from the federal government "were meant as a lifeline to keep the businesses we depend on afloat during the tumultuous times of the pandemic," Nessel stated in a press release.

"Those who defrauded that program not only cheated their fellow Americans out of

but denied other deserving businesses who couldn't get those resources.

"The state of Michigan saw millions of dollars fraudulently obtained from this program, and I'm grateful for our partners at the Homeland Security Investigations Detroit field office for their assistance with this investigation."

Golden has been released on bond awaiting the upcoming trial. Saginaw County Circuit Judge Andre R. Borrello is scheduled to preside over the proceeding.

Bay City man charged with sex crimes

CARO More than three years ago, police say, Richard L. Keysor committed sex crimes against children in Tuscola

County. Keysor, of Bay City, is charged with three counts first-degree criminal sexual conduct, two counts of seconddegree criminal sexual conduct two counts and fourth-degree of criminal sexual conduct.

Prosecutors

claim the crimes occurred from Oct. 1 through Dec. 31, 2020. They say Keysor was convicted of a sex crime in May of 1998, which would force him to serve a mandatory minimum sentence of five years in prison if convicted of any of the counts of first-degree or second-degree criminal sexual conduct.

The first-degree criminal sexual conduct charges against Keysor involve penetration, causing injury. The seconddegree CSC charges involve sexual contact that caused injury.

The fourth-degree CSC charges allege

Keysor engaged in sexual contact with a child. Tuscola County District Court officials set a \$500,000 cash bond for Keysor, who remained in the Tuscola County Jail on Tuesday night awaiting a Jan. 10 hearing on the evidence.

Meeting set on new Unionville fire hall

Township's request. Since then, Columbia Township and the village of Unionville have been exploring other options, including possibly adding space to the current hall.

The township will host a special meeting of the ACW Fire Department Board at 5:30 p.m. Jan. 9 in the Columbia Township Library in Unionville to discuss options for a new fire station and the Urban Cooperation Act of 1967. That law allows for agreements between governments to permit tax sharing, to provide the imposition of certain surcharges, among other options.

At its Dec. 19 session, the township board also:

■ Accepted, with regrets, the resignation of Richard Dehmel from the board of review. Dehmel also previously has served on the township board and planning commission.

■ Approved the annual canvas policy, which allows assessor Dara Hood to inspect parcels around the township to determine if anything has changed in the previous year.

■ Approved the poverty exemption policy and procedures, based on the latest Internal Revenue Service determination.

■ Set the board of review meetings for 6 p.m. March 5, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. March 11 and 3-9 p.m. March 12.

■ Approved John Lutz putting 10.1 acres and Joseph Lutz to enter 10.1 acres in Public Act 1116 farmland preservation protection.


The board also:

appetizers, as well as soups and salads.

The building was originally turned into a restaurant in 1937 and current owner Mary Mendyk bought it from Shelly Hayward. Mendyk did some remodeling six years ago and expanded the interior, as well as the kitchen.

Mendyk relies on long-time employees Camee Haubenstricker, Nicole Gilmore and Jamie Curtis in the restaurant, along with several other employees.

"I enjoy owning Trackside and I remodeled it a few years ago, so it's a little bigger with a bigger kitchen," Mendyk said. "The regulars who come into the restaurant are my second family. It's nice to talk to them and I get to know them when they walk in.

"We're centrally located around several communities, so it doesn't take long to drive here."

Trackside population in Reese, 1,261, regularly draws customers from Caro, Saginaw, Bay City, Vassar and Frankenmuth, as well as other towns.

Trackside's website stresses that "every meal is watched over for constant perfection," describing the atmosphere as "small, personal, cozy and with friends galore.'

As for basket dinner options, folks can order Walter's Famous Fish Planks, a basket of wings (either drummies or boneless), a chicken strip basket, shrimp, clams, scallops, or the Janson Sampler with shrimp, clams and scallops.

Hot sandwiches can come with roast beef, or turkey, or chicken, or a half-pound hamburger.

Some of the sandwich menu items include Trader Dave's famous grilled cheese (mozzarella and American cheese,

grilled onions, and ham), the Box Car Willie sandwich (ham, turkey, beef, and cheeses), the Coal Car sandwich (pepperoni, ham, onions, mushrooms, cheese and sauce), the Caboose sandwich (steak, mozzarella cheese, mushrooms, onions and sauce), and the Trackside burger (one-half pound burger, Swiss cheese, mushrooms, and bacon).

Other sandwich options include the Texas burger (one-half pound burger, pepper Jack cheese, bacon, lettuce, tomato and ranch dressing on garlic bread), and the Josh Pickell/Philly Steak sandwich (grilled, shaved ribeye, onions, green peppers, mozzarella and Swiss on grilled garlic bread).

Wraps include a taco wrap (seasoned ground beef, mixed cheese, lettuce, tomato, and onion with a choice of dressing), Caesar wrap (chicken, romaine lettuce, bacon, and tomato topped with Caesar dressing), Cajun chicken wrap (chicken, mixed cheeses, lettuce, tomato and green peppers topped with Cajun ranch) and New Orleans Cajun shrimp wrap (Cajun shrimp, romaine lettuce, shredded parmesan, pickles, and tomatoes topped with Cajun ranch dressing).

One can order a cup or bowl of chili, a tossed salad, chef salad, taco salad, chicken Caesar salad, grilled chicken salad, antipasto salad or shrimp skewer salad.

"Everything worked out for me to buy this place, and now it's been nearly three decades," Mendyk said. "I enjoy what I do and maybe one day one of my family members will take over for me."

The eatery is open from 10 a.m. to midnight Monday through Wednesday; from 10 a.m. to 2 a.m. Thursday through Saturday, and from noon to midnight on Sunday.

Caro leaders cheer new business

CARO — If motorists can't miss the new Liberty Tax & Loans sign along M-81 on Caro's southwest side, that's how Dennis Squires wants it.

"The frontage is amazing," said Squires, of Mayville, co-owner of the new business at 1243 W. Caro Road.

"This location is everything that we would want. It gives us a lot of visibility." Squires said he and co-owner Carl Taylor "love small towns, so it made perfect sense.'

Sean Squires of Caro, Dennis Squires' son and a 2007 Mayville High School graduate, is manager of the Caro business, which is the sixth location of Liberty Tax & Loans. Others are in West Branch, Bay City, Saginaw, Flint and Lapeer.

"We do personal tax preparation, and that obviously is seasonal - primarily from January through April," Taylor said. "Our second business is a payday loan operation, and that's open year-round. You bring your check stub in, or proof of income, and we give you a loan for up to 30 days."

The maximum amount of the loan is \$600. "It's just to get you from paycheck to paycheck, basically," Taylor said.

Liberty Tax & Loans opened inside a formerly vacant building in Caro. Taylor, a 1976 graduate of Burton Atherton High School, said demand has been increasing for payday loans in Michigan. Such loans can come in handy when an appliance breaks or car repairs are necessary.

"If something quits working, this is a good emergency opportunity for them to find money," Taylor said.

The business is open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. During tax season starting Jan. 15, the business will be open on Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 or 3 p.m. "or whenever we need to be at that time," Taylor said.


Customers with questions related to taxes will find they're coming to the right place, said Dennis Squires, a 1978 Fenton High School graduate.



No shipping containers, for now, for Fremont Twp.

FREMONT TWP. — For now, don't plan to put a shipping container on a property in Tuscola County's Fremont Township.

Not that they are allowed anyway.

The township's zoning ordinance, updated in 2009, bans the use of shipping containers "for use as a storage structure or other purpose."

That may change, but the township board told zoning administrator Jerry White on Dec. 14 to continue to enforce the current ordinance. The township sits south of M-46 and north of Brown Road, and east of Washburn Road and west of Cat Lake Road.

White had asked the board which way he should go regarding shipping containers because he knew the planning commission was discussing possibly allowing them, with some regulations. Board member Ron Curell said the township might have a bigger problem if White makes someone move a shipping container now, and then changes the ordinance in a couple

container for a storage structure or other purpose.

months. But Supervisor Matt Blatt said the possibility still is in the discussion stages and any proposed change would take several months. It then would have to go to a public hearing and be approved by the township board before any changes are made, and those last steps would take at least two additional months. A change may be coming, board member Kyle Thom said, but right now the ordinance does not allow it, so any shipping containers need to be moved.

The board also:

- Removed the garbage service fees from two parcels because the property owner has a Republic Services dumpster on site. Curell asked if this approval sets a precedent for others. Blatt said he thought more people will make similar requests as a result of this decision. Currell asked what would happen if the property owner stopped having a dumpster at the property but Blatt said the township would know if they stopped having a dumpster at the property.
- Learned all trees have been cleaned up at the cemetery.
 - Learned the Tuscola County Road

Commission has some concerns about Phelps Lake Road near Schott Road. Blatt said the township has spent a lot of money putting gravel on that area and there is still a water problem. He asked the road commission to fix the water problem before the township puts any more money into that road.

■ Appointed Kim Vaughan, Kyle Thom, Greg Eggert, Brandon Blatt and Dwight Uhl Jr. to three-year terms in the planning

commission and Pete Moceri, Frank Ellicott, Soleiman Seghatoleslami and Amy Prill (alternate) to three-year terms on the zoning board of appeals.

Thumb residents offered free home repairs

Habitat for Humanity of Lapeer-Tuscola announces it will hold meetings in January to kick off the 2024 Critical Home Repair grant application process in Tuscola County.

The program offers free roofs, wells, water heaters, windows, insulation and septic systems to county residents.

The meetings will be held at the Tuscola Technology Center at 1401 Cleaver Road in Caro from 10 a.m. to noon and from 2-4 p.m. on Jan. 24. A person must call 810-664-7111 to reserve a seat at one of the meetings.

Last year more than 50 families took part in the program that made repairs to help them stay in their homes. Only the following types of repairs are allowed: new roofs, doors, windows, hot water tank, furnace, insulation, well and septic systems. The grant does not cover repairs to plumbing, electrical systems and basement or foundation work.

Eligible applicants must reside in Tuscola County and own their own home and the property the home sits on. Homes being purchased with a land contract or in a mobile home park are not eligible for the grant.

During the meetings, Habitat staff will walk applicants through the paperwork needed and answer questions. Residents must meet income requirements based on family size. Please bring drivers' licenses, Social Security cards and a property deed or title.

Other meetings will be held in Huron County for residents of that county wanting the same types of help. One meeting in Huron County is set from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Jan. 30 at the Pigeon District Library in Pigeon.

Another meeting for Huron County residents takes place from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Franklin Inn in Bad Axe. The final Huron County meeting is set for 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Feb. 6 at the Port Hope Activity Center.

"We've had really good results with our applications," Housing Manager Ed Watteny said. "As long as you submit all the required paperwork and fit the income qualification guidelines and other parameters, you should be approved."

Getting paperwork done in a timely manner is very important, so Habitat stresses that anyone thinking of applying needs to attend one of the grant meetings.



Ashley HomeStore donates beds to kids



Ooohh that smell! Vassar folks worry

the former Eaton foundry site following millions of dollars worth of renovations there.

"The smell started getting worse and worse, and stronger and stronger," Mocny said in late July.

"Why? Because the plants are getting bigger and bigger."

Atkins addressed the Vassar City Council about the issue on Dec. 4.

"I don't want to have my words twisted; I think (the Canapa Valley Farms operation) is great revenue for the city – this marijuana money," Atkins said. "I also think that people have the right to smoke it, or grow it, whatever you want.

"But I also believe that those of us out there that don't care to partake in it should not be forced to smell it – like we have for the past three months or more."

Vassar City Manager Andrew Niedzinski said in mid-December that he has been meeting weekly with Canapa Valley Farms representatives about the odor issue. He said the business has undertaken a number of odor-mitigation efforts.

Niedzinski noted that recent odormitigation efforts include installation of carbon fibers on all 36 southern-facing lower exhaust vents at the facility, intended to reduce odor year-round.

Canapa Valley Farms officials say that the filters capture odors from the facility's "mother room, vegetative and grow bays."

All other operations – such as propagation of plants, drying of plants and post-processing activities – take place within the

30,000-square-foot headhouse, which runs from the north to the south and is completely enclosed, according to the company.

During winter, Canapa Farms Valley closer "operates to an indoor grow facility versus greenhouse," making for seasonal reduction of odor outside the complex, according to the company.

"All lower northern and southern vents/ louvers are closed

and insulated to prevent outside air from entering into the building corridor," the company told city leaders.

The Canapa Valley Farms complex was designed to exhaust to the south, "which is mostly forest/farmland," according to Canapa Valley officials. As prevailing winds historically come from the west, this pushes odors away from the city.

"We are currently installing additional filters on the northern exhaust fans to further mitigate against odor escaping the building," the company told Niedzinski.

Niedzinski stressed the economic impact provided by Canapa Valley Farms, which developed an abandoned foundry parcel regarded by some Vassar residents as an eyesore and symbol of rust-belt futility.

"They have invested about \$40 million into redeveloping the site and currently they employ about 60 full-time employees," Niedzinski said. "This is significant for our community."

Vassar and adjacent Vassar Township have embraced marijuana-related businesses in recent years, citing the economic boosts related to such development. Collectively, the two municipalities are home to several dozen marijuana-related businesses.

Niedzinski said that when he began

working as Vassar's city manager in 2020, "folks would often make the statement that 'The city needs to help out the schools.""

"This (Canapa Valley Farms) development is how we help the schools," Niedzinski stressed. "In 2021, the taxable value of its main parcel was \$118,000. Today, it's assessed at about \$4.5 million.

"The (property) tax revenue collected by the school district (in 2023) is \$93,138; I would say it's safe to assume that is the cost of a teacher."

Atkins said he wasn't able to sit on his front porch along Cass Avenue – one block from Vassar's downtown business district – as much as he would have liked to do in the summer and fall due to the smell.

He said a city ordinance requires "immediate" cleanup and correction of a nuisance marijuana odor reaching surrounding areas outside the marijuana business property lines.

Atkins and Mocny said the intensity of the odor depends on the direction of the wind

"That has not been the case for the past three or more months, and it's to the point where why am I being forced to smell it?" Atkins said. "Why is my right being infringed upon? Every day, of every week, of every month – during these past few months - that's all you smell."

Mocny said homes along Huron, Linn, Andy, Water and Norman streets along Vassar's east side – along with businesses – are most affected by the odor. Canapa Valley Farms is located on that end of town.

Some Vassar residents say the odor has decreased significantly since early December.

"It's anecdotal but I would say that through my conversations with area residents, it's pretty split on the folks that are upset about (the odor) versus the folks that state 'It's a better smell than the foundry," Niedzinski said.

"With that being said, we are not just going to accept the odor, and are working with them to correct it."

Mocny had words for those who say the cannabis smell is "natural" and emanating from a plant.

"You go tell that to all these people that own these houses in Vassar," Mocny said. "You tell them that 'That is a pleasant odor, and it's going to make the value of your house go up."

Mocny said a woman who recently bought a \$200,000 home in Vassar refused to open her windows this summer due to odor from the Canapa Valley Farms complex.

You CAN Go Too Slow

I think there are fundamentally two types of drivers on this planet: those who drive to relax, and those

who drive to beat the clock. I'm usually a drive-to-relax guy.

Mrs. Michael is a drive-to-conquer type of gal. This has generated some hysterical dialogue in our car at times, especially if I happen to pick the slow lane at a toll booth! We know what happens to people who speed -- they get tickets and get into accidents. How about people who drive too slow? Who (besides Mrs. Michael) decides what "too slow" looks like?

There are laws against slow drivers. These laws are more explicit when it comes to highway driving. See MCL 257.634. According to Michigan law, it is illegal for drivers to drive slow in the left lane when their speed is "less than is reasonable and proper" given the traffic conditions. Additionally, the law prohibits slow left lane drivers whose speed impedes "the normal and reasonable movement of traffic." I have to admit this is somewhat vague to me... and getting anyone to admit they're not "normal and reasonable" can be tough. That's OK, law enforcement officials are equipped to make this decision for us. If you set your cruise control to 50 miles per hour in the left lane on I-75, I'd say you're asking for it.

Here's how this connects to insurance: if you're in an accident, the determination of "who was at fault" is a lot easier if one of the parties was breaking the law. If you cause an accident for driving too slow, you're at fault and you get a ticket. An at-fault accident and a moving violation will combine to make your auto insurance more expensive for a few years.

Here's how this connects to the real world: auto accidents hurt people. Drivers going too slow can create a dangerous situation for themselves and all the irritated drivers around them, causing accidents as drivers try to maneuver to get around them. A simple rule of thumb: stay out of the left lane unless you are passing!





"How to grow a church" David Kaiser

There are many books out there on church growth. You can read what a church did to grow numerically. Unfortunately, what would work for a church in heavily populated Southern California wouldn't necessarily work here in Blaine County. I am by no means an expert on church growth, but I've made a few observations on what will destroy a church. I'd like to share with you what I've discovered.

First way to destroy a church is to be ambitious. Now I'm not saying that all ambition is bad. My wife and I encourage our kids to be ambitious about getting good grades so they can get scholarships because mommy and daddy can't afford to put them through college. But being ambitious in the church setting can be dangerous. All of Jesus' disciples argued with one another over who would be the greatest in the coming kingdom. If Jesus hadn't stepped in and set them straight about true greatness, there would be no church right now.

Second way to destroy a church is to seek to be served and not to serve. Many people will look for a church that best serves their needs. They look for churches that have the best children's/youth program, the best worship service, and the best preacher. Now there is nothing wrong with any of those things. But when you only look for what the church can do for you and not what you can do for the church, you are living contrary to the Word of God. Jesus said that He did not come to be served, but to serve and give His life as a ran-som for us.


Third way to destroy a church is to operate from one's own power. If the church is not operated by the power of the Holy Spirit, then it's left to operate by its fallen sinful nature. It's the Holy Spirit that gives us a true love to reach out to those who don't know Jesus. Without the Spirit's power, we can only operate by fear, guilt, or selfish motivation. It's the Holy Spirit that convicts a sinner of their need for Jesus.


Finally, the fourth way to destroy a church is to do nothing. While it's God's work to transform the heart of a sinner, He involves us believers in the plan. No where do you read in the Scripture where God works and He doesn't use people. We'd think it would be more effective if God just did the work Himself and left us out of the equation. But the reason He uses us in His work is because it's part of

the sanctification process. A heart that is pure will take action. If each of us in the church does nothing, then one day we will die and the church where we're at will die with us. Fortunately, Jesus' Church can't be destroyed and the gates of hell can't overcome it, but are you building or destroying your church?



Village, school reach a compromise on stadium

CASS CITY — Cass City Public Schools can use the football field and track for another 25 years.

The school district and village of Cass City agreed Dec. 11 to a new lease agreement for the facilities. The school district's board of education approved the agreement on Dec. 18.

Cass City is one of the few places where the school district doesn't own the football stadium or the track that surrounds it. The village does. As a result, the school district pays the village \$1 a year to continue to use them. The new lease begins Jan. 1.

The new lease, however, includes a few changes. Village officials wanted to be informed about any changes being made to the facility. This came after the school district, with a list of contributions, made some major improvements to the facilities this past summer.

The village wanted to be informed of any improvements in excess of \$5,000. The school district wanted the threshold to be set at \$25,000. The lower amount, school officials argued, would require them to notify the village about even minor maintenance

In the end, the two compromised on a \$15,000 limit on projects before village officials are informed. The higher limit gives the school district more flexibility.

"For an annual total, \$15,000 isn't much," village manager Deb Powell said. "I mean

was awarded to TDM Construction. The construction will take longer than the placement of a modular building, "but it still is a relatively aggressive timeline," Zimba said.

That bid comes just under the \$250,000 construction grant from the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services for construction of the community adolescent health care clinic, which will go up just northwest of the day care center.

This is the fourth change in the health clinic since the idea surfaced earlier this year. Originally, the plan was to renovate a former home economics classroom at the high school to house the clinic. Then the focus changed to renovating a classroom at the elementary school to serve as the site of the clinic. Then the board moved to seeking a modular building to house the clinic.

The district also received \$75,000 for the planning phase and \$25,000 for construction renovations. About \$75,000 of that will be carried over to spend on the clinic.

The construction is on hold until the agreements with Hills and Dales General Hospital and Thumb Psychological Services have been signed. Then the school district will have full approval to proceed.

In the meantime, the policies and consent forms for the health clinic presented last month have been reviewed by the lawyer and have been sent to the state for its review and approval. Both are needed before the health clinic can move forward.

The district will get \$180,000 a year from the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services to fund the clinic. The clinic will be able to provide wellness checks and annual preventative care, and make it easier for parents to get those services for their children without removing the child from class for a whole day. And the services will be available to parents even after most physicians' offices are closed.

The board also

- Gave Zimba an effective rating at her evaluation. Her contract was extended for another year, remaining three years long, and she will get the same 3 percent wage increases given to the district's other administrators back in July. Superintendents in Michigan can earn one of four evaluations highly effective, effective, minimally effective and ineffective.
- Received a request from student representative Shelby Vowell to improve student safety when students cross Seeger Street. The school district has ordered two electric speed signs to warn drivers to slow down in that area. The village of Cass City has agreed to the signs and they are waiting to install them once they arrive. Safety funds from the state are paying for the signs.
- Received two bids for lawn mowing, from Josh Mackoviak and Big Mack's Lawn Care of Cass City, and from All Season Sales and Rent-All of Cass City. Each bid \$30,000 to do all of the lawn and lawn maintenance for two years, except for the football stadium and softball and baseball fields. Those are done by school staff. The board approved a contract with All Season.
- Recognized Tom Montgomery of the Cass City Chronicle for his years of service covering school news and events.

Approved donations of \$10,810 from the Pinney Foundation of Cass City for the football stadium, \$6,750 from the Pinney Foundation for new pitching machines and \$10,000 from the Rawson Foundation of Cass City for the football stadium. "We have a very generous community and they are beyond appreciated," Zimba said.

- Hired Sheila Robinson, a retired teacher, to help organize the after-school tutoring program.
- Accepted the resignation of teacher Andrea Roth, who has been on long-term disability leave but has decided to retire. Zimba said she hopes Roth, who started with the district in 2010, will be able to return to a part-time position in the future, if her health permits.

that's just in repairs and maintenance. Everything costs so much."

"I think that was a positive compromise," Cass City Schools Superintendent Allison Zimba said. The number means major changes, like a new building, would require notifying the village but doing something like adding a little fencing would not.

"It just means more communication," Zimba said. "The biggest piece that was stressed as we collaboratively worked through this was that we want to have very positive, open communication between the village and the school."

That limit applies to each improvement project. If the district were to plan two \$10,000 capital improvement changes to the facility in one year, village officials would not have to be notified.

The school district also asked for a twoyear exit clause. It requires written notice.

"If we ever wanted to go in a different direction or the village wanted to go in a different direction, we'd have that option," Zimba said. "That is not our intention by any means. If nothing else we're investing in that football stadium. But I just feel that is language that should be in there, going forward."

The village council also:

- Approved the Michigan Department of Transportation resolution to allow for closures of M-81 for repairs, parades, etc.
- Approved paying Michigan AgriBusiness Solutions of Saginaw \$10,341.76 to apply biosolids from the sewer plant on local farm fields. Powell said the biosolids cost was within what was budgeted for the year.
- Appointed Dallas Rabideau to a threeyear term on the planning commission. The appointment fills the planning commission.
- Made final amendments to the 2023 budget and approved the 2024 budget. The proposed budget, which calls for revenues of \$5,764,477 and expenses of \$5,606,378, was amended to account for the premiums for 2024 general liability and property insurance from the Decker Agency. The coverage starts Jan. 1.



Are Cass City coyotes at an all-time high?

Predator hunting has become quite popular, with the coyote as the main star of the event these days. The coyote is an amazingly adaptable, and very prolific, critter that has expanded its range across North America – beginning in the 20th century - and has recently ventured beyond the Panama Canal into South America.

The coyote is now found in states where coyotes have never been documented before, and can be found in every county of Michigan, even in suburban and urban

I first began seeing coyotes in the Thumb area during the 1980s, and their population has steadily increased. From what I've observed in the field and heard from others, as well as what has been regularly seen on trail cameras, is that coyote numbers are now at an alltime high in my neck of the woods. One thing assisting the coyote in the Lower Peninsula is an overabundance of deer and a steady supply of the resulting roadkill. Besides being superb hunters, coyotes are very adept scavengers and foragers.

Now that the New Year has begun, I place a special focus on coyote hunting, with January and February being my favorite months to do so. This time frame features some very active coyotes, especially at night. Coyotes are generally very nocturnal, which is why they can thrive close to human habitation and remain pretty much unnoticed. This nocturnal activity has led to the fastgrowing outdoor pastime of nighttime predator hunting, which entails calling while using spotlights, lasers, and thermal or night-vision optics – of which are legal to use in Michigan for predator hunting.

Some nighttime predator hunters are quite serious about this pastime and have invested in costly accoutrements such as a thermal scope and a suppressor (aka silencer) on a finely-tuned rifle, not to mention a deluxe electronic caller (aka e-caller). I have a friend, a passionate nighttime predator hunter, who says it is well worth it, and when he told me how much his thermal scope and the suppressor cost, well, folks, it sort of took my breath away. But he sure has a great time and more power to him!

My nighttime technique is a bit more economical, and I have a soft spot for cloudless, full moon nights, especially with snow on the ground, and lights and hightech optics aren't required. Otherwise, I use a powerful LED flashlight with a red lens – experts say coyotes can't see red – which attaches to my gun. As much as I enjoy using mouth calls, and still do, I've grown to appreciate the advantages of an e-caller, which uses recordings of actual animals, and can be placed away from the hunter and operated by remote. My e-caller is about the size of a small lunchbox and very easy to transport. A decoy of some sort placed near the e-caller and offering an animated focal point doesn't hurt, and I have a fuzzy battery-operated affair which looks like it's half-squirrel and half-rabbit that wobbles around on a stake.

An advantage to placing the e-caller a bit away is that coyotes are very alert and cunning, and often do their final approach from downwind of the calling. I prefer placing my e-caller about 50 yards upwind of my position to fool a circling-in coyote, and sometimes there is more than just one! It can get interesting, not to mention thrilling, when the pieces come together and, yep, folks, it is a unique atmosphere which can become addictive. Last winter, a friend of mine was in his deer blind

when he turned on his e-caller and four coyotes suddenly appeared. He shot three of them using an AR-15 in .223 which was equipped with a light. He knew the coyotes were around because he had shot a buck during the deer season just before dark, and when he went in to recover it the following morning, it had been completely devoured.

Raised platforms and tree-stands are now allowed for

Cass City-area couple being evaluated

CASS CITY — A judge is set to hear an update this week on the mental competency of a Cass City-area couple accused of running a "puppy mill."

Sanilac County District Judge Gregory S. Ross is scheduled to hear an update on Friday morning in the case against Linda G. Holzhausen, 76, and her husband Daryl R. Holzhausen, 73.

Ross ordered the couple to be evaluated for their mental competency after authorities, in April, said they removed 46 dogs, four cats and one bird from a home along Huron Line Road east of Hoadley Road in northwest Sanilac County's Greenleaf Township.

Daryl Holzhausen owns the home, according to the Sanilac County Treasurer's Office. Police and Sanilac County Animal Control officers reported an "overwhelming" smell of ammonia inside the dwelling.

"Dogs were located throughout the home and in cages, living in fecal matter and on urine-soaked flooring," Sgt. Shelly Park stated in a press release.

"Many of the dogs were covered in feces and were urine-soaked."

Police said they searched the home after receiving complaints about a person breeding and selling animals there, with the animals living in "deplorable" conditions.

Linda Holzhausen and Holzhausen each are charged with abandoning/cruelty to 25 or more animals, abandoning/cruelty to four to 10 animals, and abandoning/cruelty to one animal. Linda Holzhausen also is charged with having an unlicensed dog.

The Advertiser couldn't reach Daryl Holzhausen's lawyer, Marlette attorney Eric G. Scott, for comment.

Last week, Sanilac County Animal Control employees declined comment when asked what happened to the animals removed from the home. They

> referred questions to Sanilac County Prosecutor Brenda S. Sanford, but The Advertiser couldn't reach Sanford for comment.



nighttime predator hunting and centerfire rifles or pistols .269 caliber and smaller are also allowed, but only on private land in the Limited Firearms Zone. Buckshot no larger than No. 3 can be used, and the hunter orange law applies only to daylight hunting hours. A base license is required only for Michigan residents to hunt covotes, but a fur takers' license is required for foxes (both red and gray), which are just as apt to respond to calling, and I enjoy hunting them, too. Purchasing a fur takers' license is something I always do.

I know of a nighttime predator hunter using a mouth call, and clad in snow camo except for his rabbit-fur hat, when he got a real surprise. A greathorned owl was convinced the rabbit-fur hat was the genuine article and swooped down to grab the goods. Fortunately, the talons grabbed fur hat only, which was tied on and stayed in place, and the owl quickly realized it had more "rabbit" than it wanted to handle! For a fact, birds of prey are drawn in by a calling sequence as readily as four-legged predators. Needless to say, folks, I tend to avoid wearing my warm beaver fur hat when predator calling, night or

More times than not, I prefer a shotgun for nighttime predator hunting, using No. 4 buckshot in a 12-gauge, and No. 3 buckshot turns a 20-gauge into a handy "varmint gun." There is now specialized shotgun

ammo available with predator hunting in mind, and nighttime covote encounters in "woodsy" Michigan can often be relatively close in heavy, brushy cover. I frequently hunt predators near tall prairie grass (CRP) fields and I can attest that grass of this nature can cause a rifle's bullet to go awry – at least that is my excuse.

When it comes to rifles for nighttime applications, I have a couple favorites: a vintage Ithaca lever-action in .22 magnum rimfire topped with a 1.5 x 5X scope, and a Bushmaster AR-15 in .223 topped with an electric red/ green dot sight (I prefer the green option for night work when using a "red" flashlight). The .22 magnum rimfire round is what I consider as the minimum for coyotes, which in Michigan can weigh up to 40 pounds or more. I know of one killed at night in the Thumb area which tipped the scales at over 60 pounds. The average weight is usually in the 30-pound range, but this is a lean and sinewy critter covered with thick, winter fur and can prove to be tough and tenacious.

Today, there are all sorts of "necessaries" available for the nighttime predator hunter, including how-to videos, books and even magazines. This outdoor pastime has really grown in popularity and is a great and challenging way to enjoy Michigan

Yep, folks, nighttime serenading for predators, especially coyotes, sure works for me!

Cass City park to get concrete yard games

CASS CITY — Some new amenities are planned to be in place by the spring in Cass City Recreational Park.

Tuscola County Community Foundation officials announced in December that the village of Cass City received a grant for \$4,813 to buy concrete gaming systems for the park, located near Church Street and Scott McCullough Drive. The grant was from the Claude D. and Etta H. Andrews Fund, one of the funds administered by the Tuscola County Community Foundation.

"We wanted to expand on the recreational park amenities," said Melanie Radabaugh, community development and parks and recreation director with the village of Cass City. "Concrete gaming equipment is relatively new."

Outdoor concrete gaming systems are installed in the ground and allow folks to enjoy the weather while playing some favorite games. The games Cass

City will use are manufactured by Doty & Sons Concrete Products

Concrete games the village plans to have are cornhole, ladder toss, and a checkers table with pedestal chairs surrounding The games will be strategically placed around the park's day camp center and the back side of the baseball fields.

"That another give area of the park something other traditional than playground equipment which is on the other side of the (community) pool," Radabaugh said. "These will be on the north side of the Helen Stevens

Pool. It expands the games and activities at the park.'

The plan is for the games to be installed and ready for use by April. Radabaugh said the grant covers all costs associated with the project.

"I think the games are multigenerational," Radabaugh said. "When you look at some of the old-fashioned games like checkers, we wanted to include new amenities that might attract various age groups.'

Radabaugh said the village applied for the grant on behalf of the parks and recreation department.

"The Cass City Recreational Park is a great place to offer these additional gaming amenities to residents and visitors of all ages," Radabaugh said. "We are very grateful to the Tuscola County Community Foundation and the Claude D. and Etta H. Andrews Fund for providing the grant for these new park features."

In the past, the Community Foundation has assisted in other improvements at the

park improvements, such as the covering of softball dugouts.






