The Avocado Pit

For the second year in a row, the Avocado Pit is bringing home the gold — or bowl of guacamole — securing the spot as the best new restaurant in Stowe. Opening last year, the restaurant, located near the intersection of Main and Park streets in Stowe, has taken lunch and dinner pit stops to a whole new level and has quickly risen to stardom.

The offerings are a mix up from Stowe's usual cuisine, featuring a haveit-your-way set up. From burritos and tacos — corn or flour — to bowls and salads, the process offers a quick and easy approach to Mexican-style food, right here in the Green Mountain State. Perhaps most compelling about the Avocado Pit in a town like Stowe is the hard to beat prices. A burrito starts at roughly \$12 while an individual street taco is about \$4 and a two-taco deal is just \$10. Then, pick your proteins, toppings — we recommend getting the works — and

possibly a side or two. You can't go wrong with the Chorizo Corn Queso topped with chipotle chimichurri, cilantro and onion — Muy delicioso.

The restaurant is technically a chainlet with two other locations in southern Vermont, but the team says they're more than just a restaurant; they're an essential part of the community. Our readers think so, too.

On a typical warm and sunny summer day, it's likely you'll see neighbors lined to pick up their lunch, probably conversing with each other or shouting a passing "hello" to Kristi Tatro, the restaurant's general manager, who always seems to have a smile on her face. And if you're lucky, she might even have time to draw a personalized message on your to-go bag — just another way to show the community they're happy to serve you.

Front Four Gallery

It's been just over a year since Jack Morris took over Robert Paul Galleries on Mountain Road in Stowe and rechristened it Front Four Gallery — a reference to the four classic ski trails on Mount Mansfield.

Under Morris, the gallery has begun featuring an eclectic range of contemporary art: from the delightfully fantastical ceramic monster sculptures of Gretchen Verplanck to the serene oil landscapes of Vermont artist Craig Mooney.

Morris has curated artists, whether they live in Vermont or not, who seem to evoke something of the area, whether it's the acrylic cows of Italian painter Nicoletta Biletti — which like many of their live counterparts, seem to stare straight into your soul — or the whimsical photographs taken by Hooey Mountain that place vintage ski figurines to look as if you're catching each mid-glide.

In July, it hosted a solo exhibit from artist Chip Haggerty, a Vermont self-

taught artist and longtime server in the restaurant industry.

Haggerty's work is done mostly on recycled paper bags pieced together to form a canvas for his acrylic paintings that are equal parts funky, funny and nostalgic.

Done in bright colors, the paintings sometimes feel like how you might look at the world on a sunny day: the watermelon is juicy and red, the petals of a sunflower shine like yellow rays, and as the heat creeps into your mind the world breaks down into collage.

This coming September, Front Four will host the lifework of Peter Heller, a Vermont artist who originally emigrated from Berlin and died in 2002.

Heller's work often feels like a moody abstraction of your own fractured thoughts: webbed masses of broken and intersecting pieces floating through space.

In an unassuming storefront in Morrisville Plaza, sharing a parking lot with the McDonald's, a dollar store and two stores selling various discount clothing and domestic wares, Goldfinch Gourmet Foods sells surprisingly elevated foods in a cool and calm atmosphere.

After all, why should Stowe get all the high quality "provisions" stores, and why shouldn't Morrisville have nice things?

Sheena and David Davey seem to think it does. David is a well-trained chef with top degrees, and Sheena heads up the bakery. Their magpie approach to fine foods has their display cases and shelves in the cafe — complete with ample seating — filled with a hodgepodge of fine foods, breakfast and lunch sandwiches, and unique pantry items you're unlikely to find anywhere else in town.

Their entire culinary aesthetic is encapsulated in their rotating "supreme" croissants. Try just one and you'll have a hard time going back to plain old laminated butter pastries.

Picture this. It's a gorgeous winter day in January. A foot of fresh snow covered Mansfield last night and reports from the mountain are flooding your phone. "Fresh pow!" writes your friend, who's already made the trek up Mountain Road. You pack up your trusty Subaru with all the necessities and head on your way.

Along the journey, however, your car starts making some sort of ominous squeaking, grinding and clicking noise. Just when you start to think there's no way you could make it out to play today, the imaginary lightbulb above your head dings on: Call Willie's Village Auto.

Turns out, many of our trusted readers have had this happen a time or two. That's part of the reason he was voted Stowe's best mechanic. Willie Noyes, owner and operator of the shop, opened the business in 1975 originally on South Main Street, then moved it to the 2-acre site on Weeks Hill Road a short time later.

He was 24 when he built the shop on Weeks Hill Road "on a prayer," he told the Stowe Reporter in 2019. "I built it for peanuts."

The humble shop, tucked just behind Stowe's iconic main village Street, has been an integral part of the community, both for tourists and locals alike, as seen in his almost 5-star Google review rating. According to happy customers, the shop can fix just about anything, anytime — even in a pinch. From flat tires to a bent spindle, no job seems to be too big or small for the crew.

Even more than being a tourist's best friend when their car breaks down trying to leave town, he's also a trusty hand for locals. For decades, he's been called in the middle of the night to fish cars out of ditches, he told the newspaper.

"When you went off the road back then, I gave you a piece of my mind and then I smiled at you," he said. "I used to like doing that."

Founded by Morristown's Donnie Blake in 1985 — and now owned by Donnie, Travis Cutler and Donnie's son, Jonathan Blake — the company handles a variety of projects in Vermont, including new high-end residential homes, renovations to beloved community buildings, commercial developments and energy enhancements for businesses and homes.

Donnie has held construction jobs since high school. After graduating from Peoples Academy in Morristown, he took a job in Stowe working for a well-known business owner Clint Thompson. 

Foote Brook Farm

A few miles outside of Johnson, rooted on neat green plains between the Lamoille River and Route 15, is Foote Brooke Farm, this year's best local producer. Foote Brook grows 145 varieties of or-

Foote Brook grows 145 varieties of organic produce — from asparagus to zucchini and everything in between — on 45 acres of Green Mountain soil in Johnson. It is owned and operated by third-generation farmers on the land of Tony and Joie Lehouillier.

Foote Brook is no hobby farm, punching well above its weight when it comes to getting produce to plates, but it's better

known for a charming seasonal farm store on the property, the heart of the Lehouillier's business and part of their longtime commitment to feeding their neighbors in Lamoille County.

On any given summer day from late-June through mid-November, the farm store is a bustling hive of familiar faces filling baskets with produce pulled from the ground a couple hundred yards away.

In addition to the store, Foote Brook wholesales produce through the Deep Root Organic Co-op, which the Lehouilliers founded alongside a handful of farmers in Vermont and Massachusetts in 1985. You can also find Foote Brook's products in select local grocery stores.

The Lehouilliers have deep ties to and reverence for the land they cultivate, and they believe in sun-loved vegetables grown with organic material. But in Vermont, a state with differing climates, soil and geography on every hillside, growing anything can feel like an ongoing science experiment.

Foote Brook has been at the forefront of experimentation in recent years, particu-

larly as climate change raises water levels and dries soil more quickly on increasingly hotter summer days.


To combat these forces and keep its soil healthy and productive, the Lehouilliers are experimenting with different techniques, including cover crops — a method of planting in the shoulder seasons to keep the soil healthy — through a partnership with the Natural Resources Conservation Service. It's paying off and the produce from Foote Brooke is as green and tasty as ever.






