"Jeroboam's influence brought about a separation of the tribes of Israel due to the choice of a king succeeding Solomon," explained Mrs. H. C. Orrick, jr., in her paper on "Jeroboam's Schism With the Ten Tribes," read by Miss Maxine Lamson before the Bible department, Waterloo Woman's club, Friday morning.

In her paper Mrs. Orrick went on to state that Jeroboam was appointed vicercy or lieutenant by Solomon to be in charge of the House of David. The prophet Ahyah of Shiloh told Jeroboam that the 10 tribes were to be removed from the allegiance of Solomon's son, Rehaboam, and committed to Jeroboam's charge. This was indicative of the prophets' attitude toward the policy and reign of

Jerocoam, according to Mrs. Orrick, induced the men, under him, who were working on the fortifications of Jerusalem to rebel against Solomon's despotic policy and thus showed himself to be the champion of the people and the leader of the only successful uprising against Solomon recorded by

After Rehaboam took the throne he placed heavier burdens on the north-ern tribes who rebelled and named Jeroboam as their king of Israel. Only the tribe of Judah remained loyal to the House of David or Solomon's successor, Rehaboam. Jeroboam's reign is recorded to have been a successful and prosperous one

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
