Paper Read for Woman's Club on Biblical Theme

"Jeroboam's influence brought about a separation of the tribes of Israel due to the choice of Solomon," explained Mrs. H. C. Orlick, Jr., in her paper on "Jeroboam's Schism With the Ten Tribes," read by Miss Maxine Lamson before the Bible department, Waterloo Woman's club, Friday morning.

In her paper Mrs. Orlick went on to state that Jeroboam was appointed vicar or lieutenant by Solomon to be in charge of the House of David. The prophet Ahijah of Shiloh told Jeroboam that the 10 tribes were to be removed from the allegiance of Solomon's son, Rehoboam, and committed to Jeroboam. This was indicative of the prophets' attitude toward the policy and reign of Solomon.

Jeroboam, according to Mrs. Orlick, induced the men, under him, who were working on the fortifications of Jerusalem to rebel against Solomon's despotic policy and thus showed himself to be the champion of the people and the leader of the only successful uprising against Solomon recorded by history.

After Rehoboam took the throne he placed heavier burdens on the north, which rebelled and named Jeroboam as their king of Israel. Only the tribe of Judah remained loyal to the House of David or Solomon's successor, Rehoboam. Jeroboam's reign is recorded to have been a successful and prosperous one.

Republican Wins Buchanan County Auditor Contest

Independence, Ia.—The Republican candidate's contest of election of a Democrat as county auditor, held after the canvass by the board of supervisors of precinct election boards' returns and decided by a count by a special board of all ballots cast, ended here Friday with an upset of the early decision in favor of Lloyd Todd, Democrat.

The contest was filed by C. E. Raffaut, incumbent auditor, after study of results from the various precincts which he previously had carried by large majorities convinced him that to lose he would have had to forfeit votes in greater proportion than the normal Republican loss. He also felt that in the Democratic landslide, there was a possibility that votes given him by scratching otherwise straight Democratic ballots might be overlooked, he said Friday.

The vote at the end of the recount and judgment of contested ballots Friday noon gave Raffaut 4,383 and Todd 4,367, a majority of 18 for Raffaut. Sixty-three ballots were thrown out, but even the Todd vote allowed all of those, he still would lose by 125.

There was considerable street gossip Friday to the effect that the Democratic organization of Buchanan county would institute court action in defense of Todd's right to the office.
