



Transplants are seedlings that are lifted from a seedling bed and replanted in a larger bed to allow more root and branch growth before lifted again for shipment. Example a 2-2 transplant is a 4yr. old tree that spent 2yrs in a seedling bed and 2yrs in a transplant bed. If you see a P+1 or P+2 the "P" means the tree was started in a container the number following indicates years spent in a transplant bed

Tree Descriptions

Colorado Blue Spruce: A striking evergreen known for its silvery-blue needles and strong pyramidal form. Grows 50–75 ft tall and 10–20 ft wide. Prefers full sun and well-drained, slightly acidic soils, and has excellent drought tolerance once established. Highly valued for windbreaks, screens, and ornamental plantings. Very cold hardy.

Douglas Fir: A classic evergreen reaching 40–80 ft in landscape settings. Soft, fragrant needles and a naturally symmetrical shape. Thrives in full sun with moist, well-drained soils; dislikes heavy clay. Fast growing and widely used as a windbreak species. Needles emit a citrus scent when crushed.

Norway Spruce: A fast-growing evergreen with dark green needles and distinctive pendulous branch tips. Typically reaches 60–80 ft, sometimes larger. Prefers full sun and moist, well-drained soils, but very adaptable. One of the best spruces for windbreaks due to rapid growth and excellent cold tolerance.

White Pine (Eastern): A tall, graceful evergreen with long, soft blue-green needles in bundles of five. Grows 50–80 ft tall and prefers full sun and moist, well-drained, acidic soils. Fast growing and excellent for screens. Sensitive to road salt and air pollution.

White Cedar (Northern White Cedar): A narrow, dense evergreen reaching 40–50 ft tall, often used for hedges and windbreaks. Tolerates wet soils, but grows best in moist, well-drained conditions with full sun to partial shade. Aromatic foliage and rot-resistant wood. Excellent winter wildlife shelter.

Balsam Fir: A classic Christmas-tree species with flat, dark green needles and a strong evergreen fragrance. Reaches 45–75 ft. Prefers cool climates, moist, acidic soils, and full sun to partial shade. Highly shade tolerant compared to other firs. Noted for its smooth gray bark and upright cones.

Concolor Fir (White Fir): An elegant fir with long, soft, curved blue-green needles that give off a citrus scent. Grows 40–70 ft. Prefers full sun and well-drained soils, and is one of the most drought-tolerant firs, making it excellent for landscaping in varied conditions.

Canadian Hemlock: A finely textured evergreen with soft, dark green needles and a graceful habit. Grows 40–70 ft, but can be pruned into dense hedges. Thrives in partial shade to full shade and moist, cool, well-drained soils. Not drought tolerant. Excellent for natural screens.

Serbian Spruce: A narrow, elegant evergreen reaching 50–60 ft with dark green needles that reveal silver undersides when branches move. Prefers full sun and moist, well-drained soils. Highly ornamental, with excellent cold tolerance and disease resistance.

American Cranberry (Viburnum trilobum): A large shrub reaching 8–12 ft with white spring flowers, bright red berries, and excellent red fall color. Prefers full sun to partial shade and moist, rich soils, but tolerates clay and wet sites. Berries persist into winter and attract birds.

Black Cherry: A fast-growing native tree reaching 50–80 ft. Features white spring flower clusters and dark midsummer cherries that attract wildlife. Prefers full sun and moist, fertile, well-drained soils. Important native timber species with distinctive flaky bark.

Hazelnut (American): Multi-stemmed shrub growing 8–12 ft tall. Produces edible nuts in late summer and attractive catkins in spring. Grows in full sun to partial shade and tolerates a wide range of soils. Excellent for hedgerows and wildlife food.

Lilac (Common): An ornamental shrub reaching 8–12 ft with extremely fragrant purple spring blooms. Prefers full sun and well-drained, alkaline to neutral soils. Very cold hardy. Ideal for foundation plantings and hedges.

Red Maple: A fast-growing shade tree that reaches 40–60 ft with brilliant red or orange fall color. Adaptable to many soils, but best in moist, slightly acidic soils and full sun. Known for early spring flowers and vibrant autumn foliage.

White Birch (Native): Striking white bark and golden fall foliage. Reaches 40–70 ft and prefers cool, moist, well-drained soils with full sun. Often found along streams and in upland forests. Bark peels in papery sheets.

Red Oak (Northern): A large, strong native oak reaching 60–80 ft. Thrives in full sun and well-drained, loamy soils. Features lobed leaves, fast growth, and deep red fall color. Acorns are valuable to wildlife.

Red Osier Dogwood: A shrub growing 6–10 ft tall with bright red winter stems, white berries, and creamy spring flowers. Thrives in wet soils and full sun to shade. Excellent for streambanks, wildlife, and winter interest.

White Flowering Dogwood: Small ornamental tree reaching 15–25 ft. Known for large spring bracts, red fall berries, and rich autumn color. Prefers partial shade and moist, well-drained, acidic soils. Benefits pollinators and birds.

Chinese Chestnut: A blight-resistant chestnut species growing 30–40 ft. Produces sweet, edible nuts. Prefers full sun and well-drained, sandy or loamy soils. Drought tolerant once established.

Sugar Maple: A long-lived hardwood reaching 60–75 ft with outstanding orange-red fall foliage. Prefers full sun to partial shade and moist, well-drained, slightly acidic soils. The primary species for maple syrup production.

Sycamore: A massive shade tree reaching 70–100 ft with distinctive mottled bark and large leaves. Thrives in moist soils and full sun. Extremely tolerant of urban pollution. Ideal for parks and streambanks.

Swamp White Oak: A moisture-loving oak reaching 50–60 ft, tolerating floods and wet soils. Features peeling two-tone bark and excellent fall color. Acorns support many wildlife species.

Tulip Poplar: A fast-growing native reaching 70–90 ft with tulip-shaped leaves and showy yellow-green spring flowers. Prefers full sun and deep, moist, well-drained soils. Nectar-rich flowers support pollinators.

White Oak: A stately, slow-growing native oak reaching 60–80 ft. Prefers full sun and well-drained, acidic to neutral soils. Produces sweet acorns and displays soft burgundy fall foliage. Keystone wildlife species.

Pin Oak: Pyramidal oak reaching 60–70 ft with glossy leaves and brilliant red fall color. Thrives in full sun, tolerates wet soils, and adapts well to urban locations. Lower branches often droop in youth.

Black Walnut: Large shade tree reaching 50–75 ft with high-value timber and edible nuts. Prefers deep, fertile, well-drained soils and full sun. Produces juglone, which inhibits growth of some plants nearby.

Blueberry (Blue Ray): A highbush variety growing 4–6 ft with large, sweet berries and fiery red fall foliage. Requires full sun and acidic, well-drained soils (pH 4.5–5.5). Heavy producer.

Blueberry (Jersey): A vigorous, late-season highbush type reaching 5–7 ft. Known for reliable, heavy crops. Prefers full sun and acidic, well-drained soils. Excellent for hedges.

Raspberry 'Latham Red': A hardy, upright raspberry reaching 3–5 ft. Produces mid-summer berries on biennial canes. Thrives in full sun and loamy, well-drained soils. Very cold tolerant.

Pachysandra: A shade-loving evergreen groundcover growing 6–12 inches tall. Forms dense mats and tolerates poor, acidic soils. Excellent for under trees or in low-light areas.

Snow Queen Iris: A bearded iris reaching 24–30 inches with ruffled white blooms that appear in late spring. Prefers full sun and well-drained soils. Deer resistant.

Swamp Rose: A native shrub rose reaching 5–7 ft. Thrives in wet to moist soils, making it ideal for riparian areas. Produces fragrant pink summer flowers and red hips cherished by wildlife.

Daylily 'Little Wine Cup': A compact daylily reaching 18–24 inches with deep wine-purple flowers. Extremely hardy, drought tolerant, and blooms mid-season. Thrives in full sun and well-drained soils.

Strawberry Honeoye: A dependable, early season June bearing variety known for its large, bright red berries, excellent yields, and adaptability to a wide range of soils and climates.

Ventricosa Hosta: A shade-loving perennial with glossy, deep-green leaves and tall spikes of lavender flowers in midsummer. Known for its dense growth and reliability.

Hyacinthina Hosta: A vigorous hosta with bluish-green leaves and pale lavender flowers. Tolerates shade to part sun and forms large, attractive clumps.

Albo Marginata Hosta: A classic hosta featuring green leaves with distinct white margins. Produces lavender flower spikes and grows well in full to partial shade.

F. Aureo Marginata Hosta: A variegated hosta with green foliage edged in golden-yellow. Tall lavender flower stalks bloom in summer; thrives in shaded gardens.

August Moon Hosta: A hosta with large, heart-shaped golden leaves that brighten shaded areas. Bears pale flowers in mid-summer and grows in sizable mounds.

Ninebark: A hardy deciduous shrub valued for its peeling bark, white spring flower clusters, and red seed capsules. Tolerant of tough conditions.

Redbud: A small ornamental tree best known for its brilliant pink spring blossoms that appear on bare branches before leaves emerge. Heart-shaped foliage follows.

Pink Damask (Daylily): A daylily variety producing soft pink, trumpet-shaped blooms. Hardy and low-maintenance, blooming reliably in mid-summer.

Stella De Oro Daylily: A compact, repeat-blooming daylily with bright golden-yellow flowers appearing from early summer into fall. Very popular and durable.

Dream Baby Daylily: A reblooming daylily with apricot to peach-colored flowers and ruffled edges. Performs well in full sun and well-drained soils.

Frances Fay Daylily: An early-blooming daylily with large yellow blooms and strong stems. Known for heavy flowering and easy growth.

Elderberry: A fast-growing shrub producing white flower clusters in early summer and dark purple berries in late summer. Attracts wildlife and tolerates various soils.

SERVICEBERRY: A small tree or large shrub with white spring flowers, followed by edible blue-black berries. Known for excellent fall color and multi-season interest.

Black Chokeberry: A native shrub with white spring flowers, glossy dark berries, and brilliant red fall color. Extremely adaptable and wildlife-friendly.

Liatris spicata: A native perennial wildflower producing tall spikes of purple, tufted blooms. Highly attractive to butterflies and pollinators.

Apricot Beauty Daylily: A daylily known for warm apricot-colored flowers and reliable mid-summer blooming. Easy to grow and tolerant of varied conditions.
