# METHODOLOGY

Sachs Media surveyed 850 Florida voters, June 22-24, 2026, via random sample of the Florida Voter File. Aggregate margin of error +/- 3.8% at the 95% confidence level. Results are representative by age, race, gender, political affiliation, and region.

# KEY FINDINGS

## **A majority would vote for the amendment if the election were held today, but support is steeply partisan – and very early**

- Respondents were shown the full ballot summary for the "Save Our Homes From Excessive Property Taxes" amendment and asked how they would vote if the election were held today.
- Those who would abstain were instructed to skip the question, so the results below reflect only Floridians who would cast a vote.
- Nearly two-thirds of voting Floridians (64%) would vote yes, while about a third (36%) would vote no. A yes vote is expressed by greater shares of Republicans (87%), compared with independents (62%) and Democrats (35%).
- Homeowners and renters support the amendment at nearly identical rates (65% and 64%), suggesting that renters may understand that taxes paid by homeowners could impact rental rates as well.
- Note that this survey was conducted early after the amendment was added to the ballot, meaning that advocates and opponents have yet to fully lay out their case to voters about its merits or risks.

# DATA TABLES

The following amendment will appear on Florida’s 2026 ballot. If that election were held today, how would you vote? If you would abstain from voting on this issue, please skip this question entirely and go to the next question.

**SAVE OUR HOMES FROM EXCESSIVE PROPERTY TAXES.** — This amendment benefits Florida taxpayers by: Exempting homestead properties from taxation. Exempts the first \$250,000 of a homestead's value from taxation for all levies other than school district levies and requires, through general law, a schedule for full elimination. Ensuring funding for core services. Requires local governments to use remaining property taxes solely for core public needs including public safety, education and schools, infrastructure, and natural resources. Protecting small businesses. Limits future property tax assessments on businesses. Ensuring fairness for Florida residents. Requires any person who establishes Florida residency after January 1, 2027, to maintain Florida residency for five years prior to receiving the increased homestead exemption. If approved, the amendment would take effect on January 1, 2027.
