

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

Signing of the armistice on November 11, 1918, was the occasion for such a spontaneous outburst of joy in the United States as this country never had seen. Sorrow, save for those whose sons had perished, had flown away. Never again, it seemed, could war trouble us more.

Again today, but not with the joy of that first day, Southeastern Minnesota and Western Wisconsin join the nation in observing Armistice day. We are sadder but also wiser now than on that day of blinding joy. The keeping of peace, we discover, is no painless task. War, we now know, is rooted deeper in institutions and in human weakness than we then thought. That armistice, as we now know, was just an armistice—not a permanent peace.

The labor of escaping a return of the curse which seemed so miraculously lifted on that day, 22 years ago, is serious, complicated, long. Europe and some other parts of the world already are under that curse. The United States is contributing materials and equipment, but not the men of its armed forces. What the future holds for this nation the nation does not know, but we are preparing for whatever may come.

In honor of the men who fought and of the men and women who wrought in that old war we pause again on this peace day anniversary, determined that the march toward real peace shall go on until its final goal is achieved. This day and this generation still are pledged to the faith with which on that day that generation marched. Men shall yet learn to live together in peace-no matter how far, far away realization of that ideal seems now.

Hawaii Asks Statehood.

While continental United States had its election, the people of Hawaii took the unprecedented step of conducting a plebiscite on statehood. It produced about a two to one margin in behalf of admission as a state. The plebiscite has no effect in law, no formal effeet whatever. But it is a way of calling the attention of the American people to the pleas of Hawaii for statehood and will be followed by a petition from the Hawlian legislature.

The residents of Hawaii, most of whom are not Hawaiians, can make a persuasive case. The territory has been part of this nation for 40 years. Its residents are citizens of the United States, save for a percentage of aliens smaller than the percentage in New York city. They pay taxes as those living on the mainland, have the same obligations to help defend the country, and share the general economic ups and downs of the country as a whole.

Yet they cannot vote in national elections, cannot choose their own governors and local judiciary, and cannot exercise any voice in determining national policy.

Hawaii is an important naval station and army post, and the government needs a free hand there. It has a free hand in those corners of the mainland where defense is a critical matter. Hawaii has a large percentage of Asiatic blood. Most of these inhabitants are second or third generation stock quite adjusted to the traditions of the United States.

On the mainland there is much objection to granting statehood to a political unit with an island location. That, aside from other considerations, doubtless will cause Congress to refuse approval of Hawaiian statehood.

Britain's Shipping Problem.

Sinkings and other attacks in recent days put accent on Winston Churchill's statement to the House of Commons that the toll of British merchant ships now is the gravest menace facing the empire. Examination of his speeches, both as head of the admiralty and as prime minister, show his frequent recurrence to the water transport problem.

The ultimate result will not be affected by destruction of German submarines and planes, however frequent, if the sinkings of British merchant ships continue to rise and if the St. Charles for the opening of the winter trade.

British cannot get enough new tonnage to make good the losses.

This is the problem at a time when the morale of the British people seems unshaken by airplane attacks and when an increasing flow of planes from this country seems to make more real the promise of a day when the British, if they can endure so long, will at last have air superiority.

A British commission recently arrived on this side to see what could be done about building ships here. It found our yards already taxed beyond capacity with new merchant ships and more especially warships, for which present facilities are inadequate.

If the British situation in regard to shipping grows increasingly grave, an issue may have to be decided on this side similar to one which had to be met in the World war after our entry. At that time we had, as we have today, an enormous program of warship construction authorized. But the desperate British need of more destroyers and cargo ships, and our own need of more cargo ships, necessitated forgetting dreadnought construction temporarily while we built destroyers and merchant ships. Unless new yards can be created almost miraculously, a choice something like this may be presented to this nation again.
