
# New Offer Made By 2 States For Black Hawk Bridge

It is significant in the letter that the Highway Commission stated: "We hereby state and represent that this offer is made for the purpose and with the intention that if the offer is accepted and the bridge and approaches are sold and transferred to us, we will repair, reconstruct and rehabilitate the bridge and its approaches and maintain and operate the same free of

The proposal made on behalf of the two states is in informal form. If the offer is acceptable, then the Highway Commissions of the two adopt formal resolutions to carry Waterville Youth states for the purchase of the bridge. The informal proposal stat- Is One And Only

## Bid Raised

After the Highway Commissions of the two states made a joint offer of \$50,000 for the bridge on Feb. 7, 1951, the court appointed a board of three appraisers in April, 1951, to appraise the bridge and its approaches. 
