

# **Favorites** collide

## No. 1 seeds make up Final Four in San Antonio

or just the second time, the top four seeds in the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament have advanced to the Final Four.

Florida, Duke, Houston and Auburn head to the Alamodome in San Antonio this week to vie for a national title. The only other time all of the No. 1 seeds played in the Final Four was 2008.

Florida and Auburn will tip off Saturday's action in the first game of the night, with Duke against Houston to follow. The winners will play in Monday night's championship game.

The Gators and Tigers are quite familiar with each another. The SEC opponents, both ranked in the Top 10 for most of the season, played on Feb. 8 when Florida won at Auburn, 90-81.

Florida's Todd Golden is coaching in his first Final Four. The Gators advanced to San Antonio after a furious comeback in the Elite Eight against Texas Tech. Walter Clayton Jr. scored 30 points against the Red Raiders, and the sharpshooter is averaging more than 22 points per game in the Big Dance.

Auburn is led by SEC Player of the Year Johni Broome, who averaged 18.5 points and 10.8 rebounds per game this season. After injuring his arm in the Elite Eight, Broome came back on the court to help the Tigers secure their spot in the Final Four with a win over Michigan State.

Auburn has multiple scoring options

to complement Broome. Tahaad Pettiford and Denver Jones combined for 78 points in wins against Michigan and Creighton.

Bruce Pearl is coaching in his second Final Four after leading the Tigers to the tournament semifinals in 2019.

While many teams have relied heavily on the transfer portal and experienced players, Duke is led by a trio of talented freshmen in Cooper Flagg, Khaman Maluach and Kon Knueppel. Flagg, projected as the top pick in this year's NBA Draft, scored 30 in Duke's 90-83 Sweet 16 win over Arizona. The Wildcats are the only opponent to play Duke within double digits. Duke overpowered No. 2 seed Alabama in an 85-65 win in the

Elite Eight to advance to the Final Four. After winning championships at Duke as a player and an assistant, Jon Scheyer leads the Blue Devils to the Final Four for the first time as head coach.

Following a 2021 appearance, Kelvin Sampson brings Houston back to the Final Four for the second time at the helm and his third trip to the Final Four as a head coach. The Cougars have stymied their opponents on defense while LJ Cryer and the Cougars have shot 39.1% from 3-point territory during the tournament.

Emanuel Sharp, J'wan Roberts and Milos Uzan have complemented Cryer's scoring in the tournament. After winning on a buzzer-beater in the Sweet 16 against Purdue, the Cougars pulled away from Tennessee in the Elite Eight.

Houston is looking for its first NCAA title. Duke is seeking its sixth.


