Fern grew up near Lydia, Texas. She had a hard childhood, surviving polio and a lengthy hospitalization at Shriners Hospital in Louisiana. She was a smart child and, despite her illness, she excelled in school. She went on to graduate college from Texas State Teachers College in San Marcos, Texas. She was teaching in San Antonio when she met John, who was stationed at nearby Lackland Air Force Base. Fern had a part-time job selling tickets at the local movie theater, and when John realized he had already seen a movie for which he had just purchased a ticket, he asked her for a refund. She refused his 35-cent ticket cost, but they began a conversation ... and the rest is history.

In 1950, after John and Fern were married, John was reassigned to F.E. Warren Air Force Base in Cheyenne. They moved to Cheyenne where Fern began a long and distinguished teaching career. For most of it, Fern taught at Churchill Elementary, but over the course of 38 years, she also taught in one or two other schools. She taught sixth grade and loved every minute of it. She was a giving educator whose compassion and concern did not end when the children walked out the door on the way home. Many times she provided clothing, school supplies or food to children in need. Every night she would grade papers, and on the weekends she worked on the next week's lesson plans. Her classroom was always full of red and white geraniums that she would lovingly transplant into her back yard during the beginning of each summerand then replant in pots for her classroom as the start of school neared. Fern was a wonderfully supportive and loving wife and mother. She stood by John when he tried twice to open restaurants in Cheyenne, and she waited tables after school. Then, when John decided to get his degree and become a teacher too, she was the sole breadwinner while he attended UW and commuted from Cheyenne daily. Later, Fern and John obtained their master's degrees and went on to get their MA+30 certifications.

Being teachers, Fern and John had summers off, but they spent this time and other school vacations hauling their children and her parents all around the United States in various motor homes, which Fern loved to drive. Always burdened by the crippling effects from her polio, she occasionally had trouble walking, but she never tired of traveling or seeing new sights. After she retired, she volunteered often at the pharmacy at the E.E. Warren Air Force Base hospital.

As she got older, Fern could often be found at the kitchen table of the house she loved on Maple Court, working on the crossword puzzle in the paper. She had heard this exercise was apt to stave off memory loss, and she was determined to do it as long as possible. Until her vision started fading a short time ago, she would sit at the table, occasionally reaching for the dictionary, and plugging away until the puzzle was complete.

She is survived by her husband of 67 years, John; brother, Harold (Erma) Hegler of Daingerfield, Texas; children, John (Carol) of Leesburg, Va., Lynn (Tim) Olsen of Eugene, Ore., Jerral (Jennifer) of Hillsboro, Ore., and Laurie of Cheyenne; four grandchildren; and one greatgrandson.

LOIS MOTTONEN 1929-2017

Lois Carolyn Mottonen, 88, of Cheyenne, the only child of Cecelia Sofia and Nestor John Mottonen, died Dec. 6 at Davis Hospice Center.

She was born April 14, 1929, in Rock Springs and lived in Wyoming all her life. She graduated with honors from Rock Springs High School where she earned a tui-tion scholarship to the University of Wyoming. It covered only a small part of her college expense. Student loans did not exist then. Her parents were not wealthy and sacrificed to provide the funds for her education.

Lois belonged to Chi Omega and many members became lifelong friends; she said this changed her life.

She majored in accounting and was the only woman in her class. She received

an honor book for her scholastic achievements. When she graduated, she couldn't get hired by a CPA firm because firms didn't hire women. Equal opportunity laws did not exist.

Dr. Clare Mundell, dean of the College of Commerce at the university, and Dr. W.E. Daniels, head of the Accounting Department, were both certified public accountants. They ad-vised her to apply for a job with the U.S. Treasury Department. She was hired and worked as an internal revenue agent and manager from 1951 to 1979. She was nominated for the U.S. Treasury Department's annualWomen's Award for promoting women's equity in government.

She was a pioneer in the field of accounting. She was the second Wyoming woman granted a CPA license. The Ford Foundation awarded her fellowship to the University of Virginia. She enrolled in the Graduate School of Public Affairs and Public Administration. From 1981 to 1995, she worked for the Wyoming Department of Education. Her job was funded by the Carl D. Perkins Vocational Education Act. The money promoted sex equity programs in school districts and community colleges.

In 1995, the U.S. Women's Bureau in the Department of Labor celebrated its 75th anniversary. Lois was invited to the workshop. The final event was an afternoon tea on the White House lawn. President Bill Clinton and his wife shook hands with the guests. Because of cultural impediments to equal opportunity for women, she was a lifelong advocate for women.

Lois was the first woman in government elected president of the American Woman's Society of Certified Public Accountants. Its membership was 5,000. The United Nations pro-claimed 1976-1986 as the "Decade for Women." At the 1976 AWSCPA annual meeting of the organization in Philadelphia, the officers chose the highest ranking woman member of the United Nations to be the banquet speaker. It was Her Excellency Helvi Sipila, the assistant secretary general of the United Nations for Social Development and Humanitarian Affairs. Mrs. Sipilawas a noted jurist and attornevin Finland. Her address was "Women of the World in the Next 100 Years." Since Lois' grandparents were immigrants from Finland, she felt a kinship with the speaker.

In 1976, Good Housekeeping Magazine invited 200 women leaders from across the country to a workshop titled "Women in Passage." Its theme was "Who Should Speak for American Women in the Era of Change." Lois was invited.



For 12 years Lois was on the College of Commerce Advisory Board at the University of Wyoming.

ShewasamemberoftheWyoming Alumni Awards Committee for six years. The Alumni Association recognized her as an outstanding alumna. The Wyoming Chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons appointed herits state communications coordinator. Her work was to publicize the benefits of belonging to AARP. She held the job for nearly four years. The Western Region of AARP honored her with an award for her work.

Her interest in Wyoming history culminated in her being the president of the Laramie County Historical Society for seven years. For eight, years she arranged programs for the State Employees RetirementGroup.

Playing tennis was a lifelong pursuit. She played for several decades and won many trophies. After retirement, she studied handwriting analysis and became a member of the International Graphoanalysis Society.

She is survived by cousins in Wyoming, Virginia, Washington, Utah and California.








EDWARD THORSON 1936-2017







Renneisen graduated from Chevenne Central High School in 1965 and attended the University of Wyoming, getting what he described as "a great education." He played for the Pokes golf team.

Al married childhood friend Julie Mc-Cabe on June 7, 1975, in Chevenne, and the couple honeymooned in Jackson. They raised four children, Steve, Shane, Lindsey and Catherine, primarily in Newcastle and Gillette. Catherine graduated from Jackson Hole High School.

'Julie gave me strength, purpose and joy," Alwrote. "What could have been chaos became order. Her love didn't make me perfect, but her love was perfect."

Alworked as a carpenter for four years before starting as a court reporter in easternWyoming. The legal work offers a glimpse into Al's kindness.

In 1991, Rhonda Officer started as a court reporter in Gillette, and Al served as hermentor.

"While reporting school taught me how to write, Altaught me how to be a reporter," Officer said.

He helped her with the technical intricacies of the job, found ways to bring laughter into the day, helped her deal with lawyers and judges, and served as sounding board when she needed to "hash over some of the craziness that happened in our courtrooms."

"But probably most of all, Al gave me confidence to do my job," Officer said. Officer became friends with the Ren-

neisen family, who also proved caring. They "were always supportive ofmeand myyoung children," Officer recalled.

> In the 1990s, Fred and Liz McCabe needed help with the Jackson Hole News and Guide. Fred's health was declining and the paper was suffering from internal instabilitywhile competingagainst Jackson Hole News. The Mc-

Cabes asked Renneisen to serve as general manager, and he moved his family to Jackson in 1996. He eventually worked as co-publisher with Liz.

Along with oversight of the businesses, including the McCabe commercial print shop and commercial and rental properties, Al helped at the Guide with copy editing, laughed with staff as he cooked Milk Can Stew at the summer party, spent late nights helping foreman Dan Fauver keep the presses running, swore at the unethical and complimented a well constructed sentence.

Before Fred died in 1997, he asked Alto "help take care of Liz." No small task.

Renneisen helped the News and Guide merge in 2002. Al continued to work in management, eventually retiring from the community newspaper businessin2005.

Although he stepped away from the office, he remained in the paper's partnership group and continued to help Liz take her weekly Valley cover photo.

"Lizgave more than you could give her," he wrote.

After Liz died, Al and Julie travelled; they couldn't see enough of their grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Though they had ties to Montana, Colorado and other parts of Wyoming, the Renneisens remained in Jackson.

Even as his final days approached, Renneisen remained a humble student and philosopher-learning what death had to teach.

"Life is fragile, more so than I ever realized," Alwrote. "Iguess time will tell if I did some good in mylife, but I give thanks for family and friends."

Alloved his family and wife, Julie. He waskind, especially to children. He loved it when something, whatever it was, was pure; he could hit pure golf shots. He liked good food and drink, and he loved to laugh.

He could spend long hours doing hard work, which helped him as general manager and then co-publisher at the Jackson Hole Guide and in management at the Jackson Hole News & Guide.

He liked to read and talk about philosophy and quote the likes of Nietzsche. He was curious about the universe and its inhabitants. His midcareer, 18-year job as a Wyoming court reporter placed him squarely in one of society's main philosophical crucibles: the judicial system.
