Bestselling AUTHOR

visits Mount Airy BOOKSTORE

USA Today Bestselling author Hank Phillippi Ryan made a visit to local bookstore Pages in Mount Airy on Sept. 22 as part of the shop's 'Between the Wines' event. Pages hosts weekly book clubs, author visits and more. During Ryan's visit she spoke about her newest thriller, "All This Could Be Yours" which debuted Sept. 9.

"All This Could Be Yours" is billed as a cat-and-mouse thriller about a debut author with a widely successful book, but her whirlwind national book tour takes a sinister turn when she realizes she is being stalked by someone who seems too eager to reveal secrets from her past.

Luckily, for Ryan, she is not being stalked on her own book tour, but she is no stranger to being in tense situations. Ryan also has a career as an investigative journalist where for the past 40 years she has worked to uncover crime.

"Tve wired myself with hidden cameras and confronted corrupt politicians and chased down criminals and gone undercover and in disguise as an investigative reporter," she said. Those experiences, Ryan said, color the work she does in her career as a writer of crime fiction.

Her latest book was inspired, she said, from a conversation at a book signing, when she realized her notation in a reader's book could potentially serve as a future alibi for both herself and the reader. That brief interaction led to her write a story about an author on a book tour.

Ryan said she loves the process of writing. She called it "a joy and an honor" and "a surprise every day." She described sitting at her desk in Boston looking out the window at the sugar maple in her yard and "hearing voices" of her characters as she writes, though it is largely a solitary process. Once the book is complete and she can introduce it to readers, Ryan said, "it's like walking into the sunshine after a cloudy day."

"I'm convinced that the book isn't fully realized until someone reads it," Ryan said.

She greatly values the "connection between the author and the reader" and said, ahead of the Pages event, that she looking forward to her visit to Mount Airy. While Ryan has visited North Carolina before, this was her first time in "Mayberry."

"North Carolina is somehow the book center of the universe," Ryan said. "The appreciative and smart and intelligent readers seem to congregate in North Carolina and



it is really one of my most favorite places to visit."

Ryan said she always feels welcome and embraced when she visits North Carolina and gets the chance to spend time with its readers. While her newest novel was written to be, and is, a cat-and-mouse thriller, she said it's more than that.

"It turned out to also be a love letter to independent bookstores and libraries and especially to readers," Ryan said.

Several area wineries in the Yadkin Valley have begun hosting their own book clubs and author events, bringing together both wine lovers and readers.

Dynamis Estate Wines, located in Jonesville, has been nominated for the prestigious American Winery of the Year honor by Wine Enthusiast magazine. It is the only North Carolina winery to be selected among the five nominees.

Dynamis was founded in 2019 at a historic property in Jonesville that was the former Highland Orchards which operated from 1910 to 1975, growing apples, peaches and grains. After decades of dormancy, the 1,500-acre property was purchased by a private owner who planed thirty acres of grapes in 2015 to 2017.

Local winemakers Matheson Worrell and Katy Kidd had used grapes from the property to produce wines for another area winery, which then led to a vision for a

luxury winery located at the site that features soil producing excellent wine grapes. The vineyard's location, at 1,640 feet above sealevel, also offers excellent growing conditions.

The hard work and dedication to oldworld techniques paired with modern precision has paid off for Dynamis with recognition from Wine Enthusiast.

"This recognition validates the vision we had long ago to create world-class that speak with the voice of this mountain," said Worrell. "From day one, we combined Burgundian discipline with Appalachian resilience, and today our wines carry both precision and soul."

"Wine is a story," explained Kidd, at a media event held recently to announce their nomination. Both she and Worrell spoke about their desire to stay true to wine making techniques employed for generations upon generations and using the terroir of this unique site in the Yadkin Valley to produce not only award-winning wines, but wines that will be celebrated and shared by families and friends around their tables.

Vineyard Manager Joseph Geller shared details about the rocky soil where the vines are planted that make for excellent drainage. The height of the location is another unique feature that provides some protection from heavy frosts as the cold will often settle in low-lying areas.

Dynamis differs from other local wineries, with its focus on seated tastings that provide an elevated guest experience. Dynamis' wine club is a special experience, too, as members enjoy wine pick-up parties at the luxury home located on property with live music, food and more.

Wine Enthusiast magazine is set to announce the winner of American Winery of the Year, as well as other wine awards, in November.





WINE SYMPOSIUM

set for Nov. 20 at SCC

The 2025 Southeastern United Grape and Wine Symposium is set to run on Thursday, Nov. 20, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. at Surry Community College.

This year's event is designed to explore the theme "Taste the Story: Connecting with Consumers through Education." Doors will open at 8 a.m. for registration, breakfast, and the opportunity to meet with sponsors.

The symposium is being presented by Surry Community College's Shelton-Badgett N.C. Center for Viticulture & Enology on Surry's Dobson campus. This center serves the grape and wine industry, not only in North Carolina, but the entire Southeast by providing workforce training and industry support. The symposium was created to address the needs of winegrower professionals in the Southeastern U.S. and is a direct result of SCC's mission to provide hands-on, technical education programs in the viticulture and enology industry.

"When you really think about it, we know so much about producing high quality

products, but the industry is struggling to remain relevant with consumers," said Sarah Bowman, viticulture instructor at the college. "There are many aspects to the grape and wine industry, and the consumer matters every step of the way. This event is intended for professionals in every facet of the grape and wine industry, and it's important that we work together as a whole to better understand each part of the process from beginning to end, from the farm to the family table."

Symposium presenters this year include Paul Wagner, instructor for the Viticulture and Winery Technology
Department at Napa Valley College; Jodi Songer Driedger, director of undergraduate programs at North Carolina
State University's Horticultural Science Department; Sarah Lowder, extension viticulture specialist and assistant professor at University of Georgia's Department of Horticulture;
Drew Harner, extension specialist and assistant professor of viticulture at Virginia Tech's School of Plant and Environmental Sciences; Nicole Chesney, executive director of the NC Wine & Grape Council; Jay Cummins, representative for Waterloo Container; and Lexie McDaniel, viticulture research scholar at NC State Extension. Topics for talks include viticulture education, Southeastern grape breeding

projects, NCSU current research projects, closure selection, and marketing strategies within the North Carolina wine industry.

"When people learn the 'why' behind a wine, the connection deepens," adds David Bower, SCC enology instructor. "Today's consumers aren't just looking for a flavor—they're looking for a story that mirrors their own experiences. Whether it's commitment, struggle, creativity, inclusion, or simply hard work, education gives wineries the power to make those stories resonate."

This event will also include a Grand Wine Tasting from 5 to 7 p.m. This event is at the heart of the symposium, serving wines from all around the Southeast United States, according to organizers. Food will also be provided. Additionally, industry networking will take place in the winery at 4:15 p.m. with sampling of Surry Cellars wine.

Online registration is open. The cost is \$125 for this event, including the Grand Wine Tasting, or \$50 for the Grand Wine Tasting only. Register at symposium.surry.edu.

Autumn Leaves FESTIVAL

showcases community spirit

Downtown Mount Airy streets were filled with people, music, artisans/crafters offering every product imaginable and food galore during the weekend-long Autumn Leaves Festival, which celebrated its 59th year Oct. 10-12.

While the three-day event is spearheaded by the Greater Mount Airy Chamber of Commerce, chamber CEO and President Ashly Lancaster made it known during an opening ceremony Friday morning that it really belongs to the people.

"This is our festival," Lancaster said with emphasis from the WPAQ Bandstand where more than 30 bluegrass, old-time, gospel and Americana groups would perform throughout the weekend.

CHAMBER WEATHER

Even before the official start of the annual fall gathering on Oct. 10, it seemed as though every square inch of space downtown was filled with vendor stations and people of all ages from near and far.

And that was the case throughout the weekend, aided by no rain in the forecast and pleasant weather in general, although morning temperatures were cool before giving way to warmth — what Lancaster called "beautiful fall North Carolina" days.

"The turnout is already looking great — we could not have asked for better weather for the weekend," City Manager Darren Lewis remarked the first day of festival while strolling through the central business district.

Around 200 vendors were to be found there, offering items ranging from artwork, candles, pottery, jewelry and tie-dyes to leather goods, wood creations, toys, clay works, cotton creations and everything in between.

Ellie's Slime Emporium, operated by two teen-age sisters from Concord with help from their mom, Amber Nelson, was a new festival attraction this year.

"We're excited," Nelson said of the chance to offer a variety of slime products featuring gooey substances of liquid and solid qualities treasured for both their amusement and therapeutic value.

The slime world is especially popular among young girls and Nelson was awaiting the end of classes Friday afternoon "when the kids get here."

Another relatively new presence at the festival was Caricatures by Brian Vasilik, who drew cartoon-like figures of

"I was here last year," said Vasilik, who lives in Asheville and had made an effort to be part of the Autumn Leaves event, praising it as a "nice family festival."

Another out-of-towner there, Brian Schoppe of Mocksville, also had good things to say about the gathering.

"It's well-organized," Schoppe said, indicating that the festival was offering everything a person could wish for including conveniently placed restrooms.

Food also was an attraction, ground steak sandwiches prepared by the Flat Rock Ruritan Club, for example, where long lines were the norm at its location.

UNIVERSAL APPEAL

"The Autumn Leaves Festival is such a great event for our town," Downtown Business Association official Jennie Lowry said as she surveyed the scene.

"It brings so many new faces to experience our businesses and our music — and also old friends," she commented.

During the opening ceremony, emcee Tim Frye asked for a show of hands among the crowd watching for anyone who had been to every Autumn Leaves Festival since it began in 1966.

No one except Frye had that distinction, and he complimented teams of volunteers over the years who have kept it extremely viable in a changing world.

As Mayor Jon Cawley pointed out Friday in reading a proclamation in honor of the event, it began as a celebration of tobacco and apple harvesting seasons coming to an end.

Now it revels in the breathtaking autumn season in the North Carolina foothills.

"It's turned into one of the biggest things in the southeastern United States," Frye observed, consistently ranked among the top-20 events in that region by the Southeast Tourism Society.
