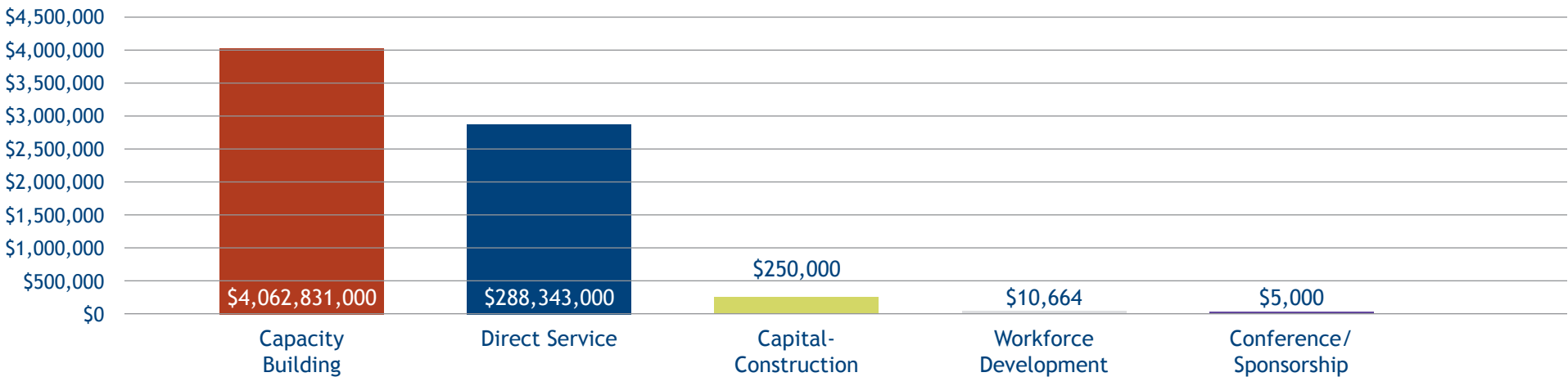
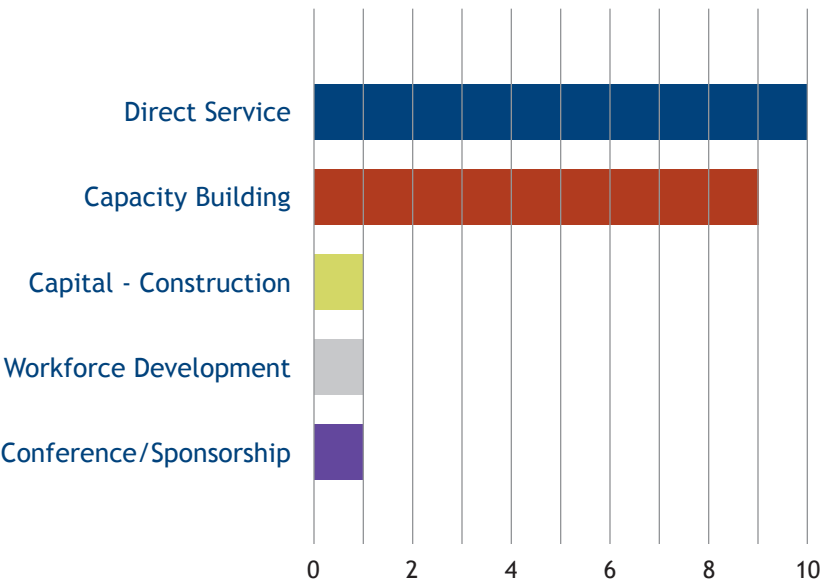

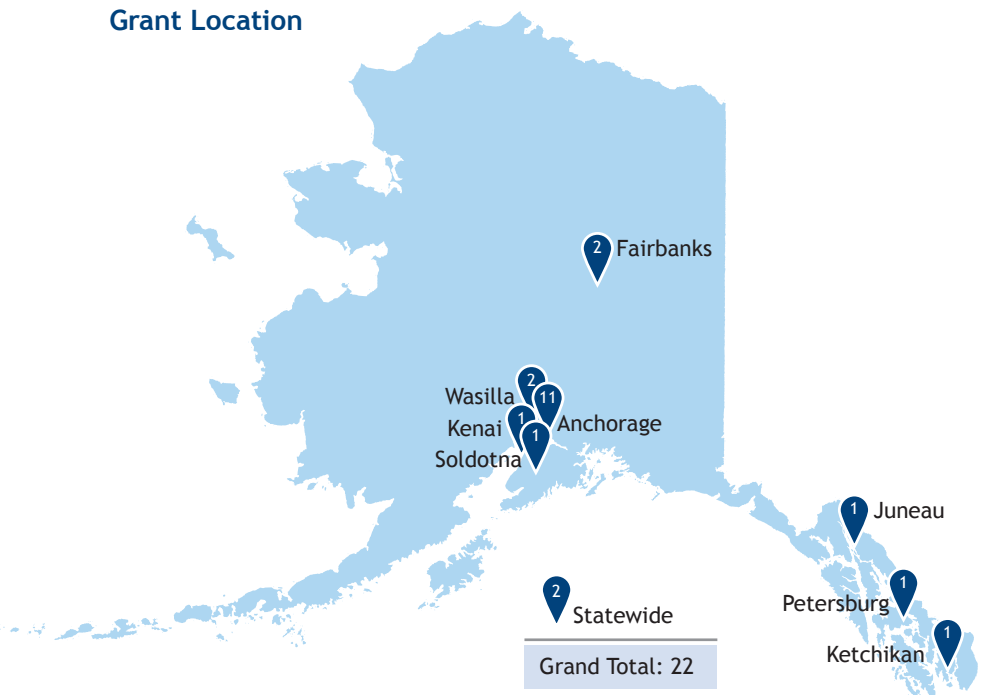
Total Grant Amount by Category

Trust funds will pay for the Alaska Center for FASD (Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders) to provide low-cost, trauma-informed “Think Brain First” trainings with consultation for frontline and direct service staff across Alaska. The Think Brain First model equips frontline staff with trauma-informed, neuroscience-based strategies that reduce crisis responses and improve client outcomes. The project will train 125 people statewide using a three-tiered curriculum that builds skills to address complex behaviors linked to neurodevelopment and trauma-related conditions. Trust funds will support one trainer position and cover administrative costs such as oversight, advertising, registrations, evaluations, and reporting. Trust funds will support personnel and planning support for track development and coordination, provide scholarships for 5-7 rural providers covering travel, lodging, and registration, and underwrite evaluation activities to measure impact. The track will feature at least six sessions developed in collaboration with behavioral health experts, including a plenary speaker on behavioral health, addiction, and recovery. Trust funds will pay for an Alaska-based Program Manager managed by Alzheimer’s Association. The Program Manager will provide or coordinate other staff to provide the core services of Alzheimer’s Association to include: information and referral, care consultation, support groups and education programs for people with Alzheimer’s disease or related dementia (ARDR) and their caregivers. Alaska has one the fastest growing senior populations in the country, and because of this, an increasing number of people have been diagnosed with ADRD. Senior services and particularly services for people experiencing ADRD and their caregivers remain underdeveloped, and Alaska is in need of additional resources to serve this beneficiary group. This project sustains the Fairbanks Mobile Crisis Team (MCT). The team provides 24/7 response 7 days a week in the community to individuals experiencing behavioral health crises. The MCT addresses recovery needs and provides trauma-informed care with a specific focus on suicide prevention. The MCT is dispatched by the 911 dispatch center in Fairbanks. Trust funds will directly pay for personnel costs (clinicians, peer support specialists, and clinical management), travel for training and mileage reimbursement, rent and utilities for the crisis team base, medical and PPE supplies, communication equipment, software to support operations, insurance, and indirect costs. Alaska Behavioral Health (AKBH), a nonprofit community mental health provider, operates the Fairbanks Mobile Crisis Team, which consists of mental health professionals and peer support specialists who together assess and stabilize individuals experiencing a mental health crisis. The Fairbanks MCT is a proven and effective component of Alaska’s Crisis Now system. The team provides 24/7 crisis response and reduces reliance on emergency departments, law enforcement and inpatient hospitalization. In 2024, the Fairbanks team responded to more than 800 calls, with 85% of crises resolved safely in the community. Only 9% required referral to inpatient care and 7% involved law enforcement on scene. In April of 2025, AKBH entered into an agreement with the Alaska State Troopers which has resulted in a 40-50% increase in call volume. The program has consistently demonstrated that the team is diverting individuals from higher cost and levels of care. Trust funds will pay for a 2-year project piloting Health Related Social Needs (HSRN) Navigation at Anchorage Neighborhood Health Center (ANHC). More specifically, Trust funds will be used for personnel and associated costs supporting program development, service implementation, and sustainability efforts. Anchorage Neighborhood Health Center (ANHC) is a Federally Qualified Health Center offering a diverse array of healthcare services encompassing primary medical, behavioral health, and dental care. Recognizing both the importance of social factors in achieving health outcomes and the complex social needs of the ANHC patient population, ANHC is proposing a pilot program to integrate HSRN navigation into patient care, with special attention to Trust beneficiaries. Out of 27,184 unduplicated patients served at ANHC who have an assigned primary care provider (from May 2022 to present), 9,412 patients (35%) meet the criteria for inclusion as Trust beneficiaries. This pilot project will focus solely on Trust beneficiaries. It aims to improve health outcomes and reduce healthcare disparities for approximately 450 Trust beneficiaries participating in the pilot.		N/A

The Association of Alaska School Boards (AASB) will use Trust funding to contribute to three key initiatives: 1) Project Transform: Trauma Engaged Schools; implementation and evaluation of trauma-engaged practices across Alaskan schools, 2) Full Service Community Schools (FSCS); a comprehensive “wrap-around” support for students and families transitioning into kindergarten and middle school in Southeast Alaska, and 3) The Alaska Family Engagement Center (AFEC); which directly serves family and school partnership work, policy development, and training to empower families and strengthen school-family partnerships across Alaska. This project serves to train schools in trauma-informed responses to students, work with families and students during crucial transitions (entrance to kindergarten and middle school transition), and to engage families with schools in a partnership to better connect families to the education of their children and to resources to address issues impacting children. Trust funds will support costs for personnel, travel, space and facilities, supplies, and other costs. This project will launch Big Futures, a new program enhancement to Big Brothers Big Sisters of Alaska's (BBBSAK) core mentoring model by integrating career development and job readiness activities for youth ages 13-25, particularly those transitioning out of foster care. This enhanced mentoring will include introducing an individualized Career Pathway Plan for each participant at enrollment, which will guide goal setting and help inform mentor matches aligned with youth interests and aspirations. BBBSAK will also expand their monthly group activities by integrating career readiness, career exposure, and life skills development into events. This program will directly improve protective factors for mental health—reducing depression, anxiety, and isolation—and ultimately preventing substance misuse and the generational cycles of trauma that lead to Trust beneficiary status. Trust funds will support personnel time for support specialists in Fairbanks, Juneau, Haines, and Mat-Su, as well as travel for site visits, program supplies, and recruitment marketing. Trust funds will help to renovate and expand Challenge Alaska's Keil Center for Adaptive Sports in Girdwood, which serves as Alaska's only dedicated adaptive recreation facility. Challenge Alaska is a nonprofit organization has been running the Keil Center since 1993; their mission is to improve the lives of Alaskans with disabilities through adaptive sports, therapeutic recreation, and education. The project will expand the facility to include an adaptive gear shop, volunteer space, accessible offices, and dormitories. A fire sprinkler system will be installed to reinstate overnight accommodations for rural school groups, veterans, and visiting instructors. Trust funds will also support the modernization of heating, plumbing, and electrical systems for long-term sustainability. This project will expand Challenge Alaska's capacity to serve more Trust beneficiaries, including veterans with disabilities, youth with developmental disabilities, individuals in recovery, and people with mental illness. Trust funds will maintain a Mental Health Counseling Coordinator position for the Anchorage Project Access Pro Bono Counseling Program and support general operations for three years. Christian Health Associates (CHA) is a non-profit corporation that maintains various associates, including Anchorage Project Access (APA). APA provides Alaska's health care safety net for Trust beneficiaries, which ensures access to donated specialty medical, dental, and mental health services. Using APA as a clearinghouse for donated behavioral health care will make it easier for mental health practitioners to offer pro bono services and for beneficiaries to obtain them. This project will primarily serve low-income, uninsured beneficiaries who have a mental health condition, though all beneficiary categories may be served through the project. Beneficiaries will also be screened and referred to health insurance programs so they can obtain long term access to care. This project, implemented by The Ciri Foundation (TCF), will support the adaption and pilot of a prevention curriculum which focuses on the Three Pillars of Trauma-Informed Care: Safety, Connection, and Emotion and Impulse Management that was originally demonstrated to be effective by Cook Inlet Tribal Council with the parents of Early HeadStart children. The adapted curriculum will be utilized with an Alaska Native young adult student population who have received a scholarship from TCF. The curriculum is anticipated to be a 10-week program which includes core information (on ACEs, trauma, etc.) and coping skills development. The program will be completed with 4 cohorts of students/scholarship recipients. Trust funds will be utilized primarily for curriculum adaptation, delivery and evaluation, and personnel costs. Trust funds will support Facing Foster Care in Alaska (FFCA) in expanding their peer support network, expanding their programming in peer navigation services, and developing and executing a formal model of peer navigation services based on best-practices for youth in foster care or with a history of foster care. This 2-year grant will support personnel, the development of a peer navigation model, the evaluation of the peer model effectiveness, travel, and stipends/Honoria for foster youth who are offering lived experience expertise. Research consistently shows that youth who experience foster care are far more likely to face mental health challenges, including depression, anxiety, and Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) than their peers in the general population. FFCA was established in 2003 to serve as a youth advisory board for the Office of Children's Services (OCS) and has grown into a statewide non-profit. It is led by current and former foster youth (alumni) and is focused on direct services, training, education, advocacy, and peer support. Trust funds will provide rent for Trust beneficiaries reentering society after incarceration, either on probation, parole, or pretrial status. The Ketchikan Wellness Coalition is receiving the funds to pay for Trust beneficiary rent at The Reentry House in Ketchikan, Alaska. The KWC comprises individuals, organizations, businesses, local government, and service representatives working together to solve issues affecting the community. As part of a structured nine-month reentry program, participants are asked to contribute program service fees on a sliding scale, incentivizing financial independence while respecting individual circumstances. The majority of the budget is dedicated to paying housing and utility costs for trust beneficiaries. The expected outcomes for this project are for Trust beneficiaries to report an increase in their housing stability, improved access to behavioral health services, enhanced recovery outcomes, reduced recidivism, and the ability to succeed in work. Approximately 24 Trust beneficiaries are anticipated to be served through this 2-year grant. NSCI is a non-profit that operates home-delivered and congregate meal programs, transportation services, activities, and information and referral services for seniors through the Nikiski Senior Center, Senior Shore Apartments, and the Kenai Peninsula Family Caregiver Support Program that provides needed services to unpaid caregivers of family and loved ones across the entire Kenai Peninsula. It leverages broadband expansion and new IT infrastructure to deliver distance-based training, career pathways, and supportive services that reduce barriers to employment - particularly for Trust beneficiaries with disabilities. The Trust funds will directly support: Purchase and installation of an advanced IT platform and connectivity equipment; six trips to rural communities to install IT systems, set up hubs, and conduct community, and enrollment/outreach; and stipends for educators and facilitators at new remote sites. A statewide tour is planned in 2026 to bring interactive workshops and performances to communities such as Nome, Brevig Mission, Teller, St Mary's, Pilot Station, Bethel, and Fairbanks. Research shows that creative expression through music builds resilience, supports emotional regulation and reduces isolation. This project provides strengths-based prevention and early intervention opportunities for youth across Alaska, that can help prevent youth from becoming Trust beneficiaries. Trust funds will support: Artist performance fees and facilitation costs for music and dance workshops with youth, travel expenses, and the purchase of harmonicas for distribution to students. PMC will use Trust funds to expand this delivery model into the Long-Term Care and Home Health community. Petersburg is a federally recognized health professional shortage area, meaning there is not enough licensed health professionals to meet the basic needs for a community of its size. PMC is the main provider in the community and has the capacity to expand their services for Trust beneficiaries through the use of tele-psychiatry and local personnel. PMC also has the experience with long-term care beneficiaries and is positioned to better meet their needs through this tele-health expansion. Trust funds will support a three-year start-up operational funding for the Peer Support Program within Southcentral Foundation’s (SCF) new crisis stabilization and crisis residential program in Anchorage. The peers will work with an interdisciplinary team whose focus will be working with Trust beneficiaries requiring 23-24-hour level of crisis observation and stabilization. SCF’s program will be accepting all adult Trust beneficiaries in this program. Funding will provide positions and training needed to successfully launch and sustain peer program services. This project is in alignment with the Crisis Now model, and addresses urgent service gaps in Alaska’s behavioral health system, specifically the lack of crisis stabilization and crisis residential services for adults experiencing a range of behavioral health emergencies. The “no wrong door” approach for beneficiaries experiencing a behavioral health crisis is needed in Anchorage and will provide a safe and secure triage treatment setting for their care. A core feature of this project is the integration of peers (individuals with lived experience) within the staffing pattern. Trust funds will support True North Recovery (TNR) with operation costs of the existing mobile crisis team (MCT) in the Mat-Su region. This grant represents years 4 and 5 of what was originally anticipated to be a five-year period to expand and support the continuum of care for crisis services in the Mat-Su. The MCT actively responds to individuals experiencing a crisis within a 30-mile radius of Wasilla, and addresses recovery needs and provides trauma-informed care with a specific focus on suicide prevention. This project bridges the critical gap for immediate, on-scene support for individuals reliance on emergency room visits for crisis intervention, and drastically reduces the wait time between a crisis event and the first day of service. Since its inception three years ago, TNR's MCT has responded to 1,077 dispatched calls. Of these 1,077 responses, 952 or 88% were resolved in the community. TNR has demonstrated strong relationships with regional partners, and their MCT response data have consistently surpassed benchmarks in the number of individuals stabilized in the community instead of accessing higher levels of care.
